AN OPINION. Rendered by County Judge Thomas. REFERS TO GARNISHMENTS. Of Interest to Merchants and Workmen, as Well as Others. THE OPINION IN FULL. The following opinion was rendered by County Judge Thomas on Monday in the much-exploited garnishment case. It is of interest to the residents of Paducah, especially the merchants and workmen:

McCracken Quarterly Court. Thos. Bailey, Appell't vs. Biederman Gro. Co., appellee. This is an appeal from the judgment of E. J. C. Tully sustaining an attachment and applying the process of the attached fund to the payment of the plaintiff's demand, which amounted to over ten dollars (\$10) exclusive of interest and costs.

There are three questions of law which arise upon this appeal: First—Has this court appellate jurisdiction over the orders and judgments of justices of the peace of this county. Second—Can a defendant in a magistrate's court properly appeal from the orders of the justice sustaining an attachment against him and directing the property attached to be applied in satisfaction of the judgment against him without counteracting the grounds of the attachment. Third—Are the wages of a laborer who is a bona fide resident of the state with a family, who has no other personal property, or choses in action out of which to claim said provisions subject to garnishment for debts contracted for food, fuel, house rent, fuel or medicine for his family.

ARRIVING OF THE SHOWED THE plaintiff from executed his judgment by stay a sale of the property if a supersedeas be executed. It is earnestly insisted by counsel for appellee in this case that inasmuch as the grounds of the attachment have not been controverted, that it is the duty of the court to sustain the attachment and apply the attached fund to the payment of the judgment, although the property attached may be exempt from garnishment, and direct the authority above in support thereof.

It is a well established rule of law and needs no reference to authorities to sustain it, that where there are two statutes seemingly conflicting they must be made to harmonize if possible, and we find no obstacle in harmonizing Section 1697 and Section 1701. Section 1697 provides the following property of persons with a family resident in this commonwealth shall be exempt from execution, attachment, distress or sale, namely: (After giving a list of articles). 'So-called provisions, including bread stuff and animal food to sustain the family one year; not to exceed forty dollars in value for each member of the family, etc.'

Wherefore it is adjudged by the court that the attachment be sustained but the fund garnished in this case is adjudged to the defendant and that the plaintiff (appellee, Jake Biederman Grocery Company) pay the costs of this appeal.
