THE PASSING OF FREE SILVER. Hon. Charles T. O'Ferrall, Democratic governor of Virginia, in a speech Sept. 11 said:

I am confident that the doctrines of the Chicago platform will not much longer be masqueraded as Democratic principles.

Free silver is retreating before the returning tide of prosperity. It can only live on "hard times."

It is beginning to pant for breath already, under the pressure of the advance in wheat and the reopening of mills, mines, and factories.

The free silver campaign slogan of last fall, "as silver falls, wheat falls; as silver advances wheat advances," is no longer heard, and the people are fast learning that it is the law of supply and demand, and not the price of silver, that controls the prices of the farmer's products and the laboring man's wages.

Free, unlimited, and independent coinage of silver is doomed, and no strong political party of the present, or future, will ever put itself to death by declaring for it in national convention.

GEMS FROM REED. Within the last few days Hon. T. B. Reed has expressed his opinion on the situation as it now is.

Below are given a few extracts from his speeches and articles:

"All the symptoms of prosperity are here. Men are willing to lend money and sensible men are willing to take it and risk it in new enterprises. In a word, it looks like 1879."

"Every historic period of revival has been like this. Some event at the right moment happens, like the resumption of specie payments, the settling of money in motion by reduction of the interest on part of the national debt, the passage of a tariff bill, which, rightly or wrongly, the people believed in. Human nature and human affairs, made ready for the change, have always done the rest."

"These blind leaders of the blind are explaining why the rise in wheat is no help to farmers. It is only an accident, they say. Poor crops elsewhere, and so we sell at a profit that is all. You will be no better off in the end, for such accidents cannot happen in the future. You will have to pay high prices for what you buy, and so you will be in the same case in another year as you were year before last. What idle talk this is! The returns from the wheat crop and the other cereals spent in purchases start the nation to work."

"A good many questions have been settled these last few years. In all the debates in the house this past session, there was but one man who even mentioned the 'consumer,' and he was from Kentucky. In other years, we had no population except 'consumers'; producers did not exist. Not a word did we have in the debates of this year about the need of low prices. We already had them, and months which used to start the echoes in wild loggings for low prices were devising plans for raising prices."

THE STATE CAMPAIGN. The campaign in Kentucky may be said to begin in reality on Friday of this week, when J. G. Bailey and Joe Parker, the nominees respectively of the Republican and Populist parties, speak in joint debate at Falmouth.

Mr. Bailey will stand for the Republican doctrine of sound money, having gold as the basis of currency, as now, with such use of silver as is possible consistently with maintaining its parity with gold, and a system of bimetalism which can be established by international agreement and for the Republican doctrine of protection which will promote our own industries and give employment to our own people.

Mr. Parker will fight for the Populist doctrines, which were mainly adopted by the convention that nominated Mr. Shalkford.
