YELLOW JACK IN 1878.

To those who have a lively remembrance of the yellow fever plague in 1878, there is no wonder that people are fleeing from localities in the South where the disease has appeared recently. All evidence agrees, however, that the type of the disease prevailing this year is light, compared with that of 1878, when it was very malignant in character.

The start of the epidemic of this year was at New Orleans, where the first case was discovered on the 23d of May, it originating from a vessel's officer who evaded the quarantine, coming from a foreign port. He was taken sick after arriving in New Orleans and died of the dreaded disease. From his case it spread through the part of the city where he lodged; but the fact that yellow fever was in the city was kept from the general public until the 26th of July, when it was announced to the general public, coupled with the statement
