RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

An I. C. Train Runs Almost Across a Trestle on the Ties.

A Close Call—Another Train Derailed Near Wingo Yesterday Afternoon.

Passengers on the train which left here yesterday afternoon for Louisville, No. 202, had a close call not long after the train had left. She was a little late, and up between Big Clifty and Grayson Springs, the engine jumped the track and ran almost across the trestle on the rails before she was stopped. The marks were clearly visible on the trestle where she had passed, and caused a shudder to pass through passengers who passed over it afterwards.

Train No. 204, which was due here at 2:15 this morning from Memphis, was mysteriously derailed near Wingo, and was delayed about 3 hours as a result, arriving here after 5 o'clock. There was a shock felt, and in a short time she was derailed. It was not discovered by the crew what occasioned the accident.




