FULTON COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CLUB.
Quite a large and enthusiastic crowd of Democrats assembled at City Hall, Friday night last, for the purpose of organizing a Cleveland and Thurman Club.
Mr. Jno. W. Cowgill, chairman of the Fulton County Democratic Committee, called the meeting to order, and nominated Mr. Geo. Warren as temporary chairman. The motion carried, and Mr. Warren, on taking the stand, made a few timely remarks in regard to the organization of a club, and urged the Democrats of Fulton county to fall into line and go to work for the success of the ticket—the grandest, in his opinion, that has ever been presented to the American people.

Mr. R. S. Murrell was chosen temporary Secretary.
Judge C. L. Randle being present, was called for and made a ringing Democratic speech, which was loudly applauded.
At the conclusion of Judge Randle's remarks a call was made for members, when sixty-three Democrats, mostly young men, signed the roll.

The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to correspond with the District Electors and invite them to visit us and address the Club at their earliest convenience.
Before adjourning, the Club, by a unanimous vote, elected Judge Randle an honorary member.
As a further business, the Club adjourned to meet again next Wednesday night, 11th inst., at City Hall.
