—Mr. Mart Powell, who has been confined in the Hopkinsville Asylum and who made his escape therefrom about two weeks since, was apprehended in this county, Monday, and is now held in the custody of the jailer, awaiting the proper officers to be returned to the Asylum. Powell talks sane and rational, insisting that there is no need of his being confined, even alleging that himself and some others confined at Hopkinsville are wrongfully held, and held only because of the per capita revenue derived from the State to the Superintendent. Powell talks so reasonably and rationally that hearers are apt to give credence to his earnest talk, but it is probably only a phase of his mania. The Superintendent gets an annual salary for his services, and we understand, which is in no sense dependent upon the number of patients under his charge. Really, the great trouble with officers heretofore has been to get patients received. Besides, Dr. Rodman, the Superintendent, bears an excellent reputation as a physician, and his investigations by the State, has received the highest measure of praise for his conscientious and able discharge of duty. Powell has been sent to the Asylum three times, and twice discharged, like many another unfortunate of his class, and it is not until he is again committed to the Asylum that he is cured.

—At Frankfort the school board has sent the city council on a writ of mandamus to compel it to levy a school tax of 25 cents, as requested by the board, the council having levied only 15 cents tax. The same kind of a suit was brought a few years ago in Owensboro as a result of the foolish obstinacy of some members of the council, and was promptly decided in favor of the school board.

—A number of citizens who had assembled at the court-house, Wednesday night, to hear Hon. W. M. Smith, District Elector, were disappointed, that gentleman having been unable to fill the appointment. THE CAMPAIGN OPENED.

HON. C. T. ALLEN,
President of the Kentucky State Democratic League of Clubs, will address the people to-morrow night, in front of Laclede Hotel, on the issues of the Presidential campaign, and especially upon the matter of party organization through party clubs. The most thorough organization known in the history of political parties in Kentucky is being inaugurated by the State Committee and through the State League of Clubs, Mr. Allen being the President of the latter Association. The word comes to the Democracy of Fulton that the Democrats throughout the State are rallying to the ticket of Cleveland and Thurman, and party organization, with unprecedented enthusiasm, and Fulton Democrats are expected to do their duty in the grand work. The Republican leaders have promised to carry the State for Harrison and Morton, and the Democracy propose to answer their boastsful pretensions by an old-time majority of 50,000. Those of fellow-citizens who will turn out to-morrow night, will enjoy an intellectual treat, and a fair, liberal, and able exposition of the issues in the great pending political contest.

MAEK BROWN, OF FULTON, assassinated by a Crauk.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Aug. 21.—A terrible tragedy was enacted at 9:30 o'clock, at the Penbody Hotel, Mr. Maek Brown, aged 28, a resident of Fulton, Ky., was seated at the rotunda of the hotel talking with F. M. Tisher, also of Fulton, when all unseen a young man approached with pistol in hand and deliberately fired two shots at Mr. Brown. Both took effect in his right breast, and staggered to his feet, the wounded man not knowing who his assailant was, ran into the bar-room of the hotel exclaiming, "I am shot," and fell unconscious to the floor. Medical aid was promptly summoned, but he died twenty minutes afterwards.

While Mr. Brown was trying to evade his assailant, a gentleman standing near caught the man who had done the shooting, and assisted by a police officer disarmed him. He proved to be Louis Lane, aged 26, employed as stenographer at L. & E. Lehman's law office. He is undoubtedly insane. When questioned at the station house why he shot Mr. Brown, he replied: "I felt to-night that I had to kill somebody, so I took my two pistols and started up town for that purpose. I wanted to kill a man at the Penbody Hotel, and shot the man I did because he was not looking at me."

Maek Brown, his victim, was employed as a clerk for John A. Wyatt, at Fulton. He was en route to Hot Springs, having arrived from Fulton at 3 o'clock this afternoon. His wife died about six months ago. Those who know him speak in the highest terms of his good character and sterling qualities.
