### THE WORLD'S FAIR VOID.

The Terrible Muddle of Our Legislature.

The Legislature has been muddled from the beginning of the present session, and now comes the decision of the People's party to deal on the World's Fair bill, declaring the appropriation void because not passed as the Constitution required. The issue between Gov. Brown and a majority of the State Senate as to what constitutes the "final passage" of a bill, is familiar to that class of our readers who have given that matter consideration. The court sustains the Governor.

The World's Fair bill being declared void, because not properly passed, it, of course, follows, that all other bills passed in the same way are also void. In fact, the Legislature, so far as new and needed laws are concerned, is nearly back at the beginning, because nearly all the work of the session will have to be done over again. Hence, the end of the session is many months off yet.

### Opposed to the Canal.

On the motion to print the proceedings of the New Orleans Nicaraguan Canal Convention in the Congressional Record, Congressman Stone objected, stating his reason that he was opposed to the scheme. A large majority of Kentucky Democrats are with Mr. Stone. It is true that the canal project is approved by the National Democratic Convention, and we believe, also, by Mr. Cleveland, and it is, perhaps, true that the canal is of great importance to the commerce of the world, but plain, Democratic teaching is against taxing the people to aid such gigantic schemes or enter prices in foreign countries.

### The Great Pension Burden.

The greatest burden of tax on the people of the United States is the millions of dollars required to pay the pensioners, and it has grown into a fixed conclusion that there is no possible relief—that pensions once allowed must forever continue. The great body of the people, Democrats, Republicans, and all parties, believe in the justice of paying liberal pensions to the deserving and worthy soldiers, and, this being true, it does look like an agreement might be reached to lop off the unworthy and the undeserving. But the trouble is, and, perhaps, always will be, that any movement to cut off the unworthy is interpreted to mean enmity to the whole pension business. The hope of relief from the unworthy is from the action of the real deserving soldiery. The soldier who did fight, was wounded, or disabled in the service of his country, has no cause to fear an honest investigation, because it will bring him not only his pension but the honors he is entitled to. A movement is now on in Congress looking to this result.

—The National Farmers' Congress, recently in session at Lincoln, Nebraska, has put itself on the side of good roads, because they say: "Good roads would save the farmers of this country an annual average of one hundred million dollars, which would permit of the regular attendance of farmers' children at schools; would eliminate the mephitic and unsocial features from farm life and would make possible and probable the active participation of the farmer in public affairs which is to the best interests of all good people." A resolution was also adopted recommending to farmers everywhere that they take in the movement for better roads, that the position to which they are entitled by their numbers and their vast financial, social and political interests is directly affected by this movement.

### Let the People Elect.

The disgraceful disputes as to the election of United States Senators from the States of California, Montana, Kansas, Nebraska and Wyoming, is enough to attract public attention to the better plan of electing U. S. Senators by the direct vote of the people. Immediately after the November elections it was published, and no where disputed, that each of these States would elect a Senator, not a Republican—either a Democrat or a People's party man. Since then the counting boards have reversed the published election returns, and that Republican Senators will be returned from some or all of these States. The result is charge of fraud, corruption, stealing, is in the public mind, and with so much evidence of truth that it can never be eradicated. Such things have occurred time and time again in the past, and is rapidly convincing the people that the present plan of electing U. S. Senators by the Legislatures is so susceptible of fraud that it needs to be abolished.

The people are persuaded, also, that the U. S. Senate, like the English House of Lords, is not responsive to the will of the people, and as at present constituted has no place in a Republican form of Government. The Democrats, for instance, several times, have, by the voice of the people, obtained a sweeping majority of the House, and even the Presidency, but the will of the people has been blocked by the Senate, because that Senate was not answerable to the voice of the people. The election of Senators by a direct vote of the people will make each branch of the Government subservient to the people's will.

Living in the same county, in the same neighborhood for 68 years, we doubt if he had an enemy, or any living being can say anything of him, except, well done, good and faithful servant, enter into the joys of a new life.
