## DR. C. H. HUBBARD DEAD.

One of Our Oldest and Most Worthy Citizens.



Dr. Charles H. Hubbard, one of our oldest and most worthy citizens, died, Monday, Sept. 30, at 12:35, p. m., aged about 63 years. He had been falling in vitality a year or more and seemed to have been possessed during this time, of the consciousness that he would never recover from his affliction, and that his death was rapidly approaching. Few men have ever lived in this community better known from long residence and family identity with Hickman and Fulton County. He was considered by many the wealthiest man in the county, but for many years has not actively engaged in any business. He was kind hearted, as tender and considerate for others as a gentle woman, honorable, upright and conscientious in all his dealings and relations with his fellow man. Quiet, unobtrusive, yet the best of this community have just cause to remember with grateful hearts, his silent and liberal charities.

### STATE MUST ENFORCE ORDER.

Gov. Beckham has done his duty in sending troops to Hopkins county, after a careful investigation of the situation there. The action of the Governor is to be commended, since the county authorities have shown themselves unable to maintain order. Conditions in what was formerly one of the most law-abiding and progressive communities in the state have been approaching anarchy. Armed bodies of men have been assembled and have been marching, countermarching, forming hostile camps and exchanging shots in utter defiance of the county authorities and the laws of the state. There have been men to come from other states to take part in threatening demonstrations. Houses have been fired upon at night, and a number of men have been seriously wounded, while the whole community has been terrorized.
