A Patriotic Gathering.

Come and gone. Speaking of the long-looked-for river event, the passing of President Roosevelt, the aggregation of governors and the Waterways Commission. It came off last Thursday at 3:15 p. m. Thousands of people had gathered to our city early in the day to await the arrival of the flotilla. When the first boat was sighted some ten miles up the river, bells and whistles announced the fact, and a grand rush was made for the river bank. The first boat in the parade—U. S. Mississippi—carried the President, who stood alone on the upper deck in his characteristic pose, bowing, waving his hat and exchanging greetings with the enthusiastic thousands who stood on the bank of the river. Unfortunately no time was allowed for a stop at our city, but all had a splendid view of the president, his party and beautifully decorated boats. What Excuse Now?

In 1906 there were democrats who said they could and would not support the democratic ticket because of the free silver plank in the platform. The 52nd Annual Meeting of the Kentucky State Medical Association will be held at the Galt House in Louisville on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, October 15, 16 and 17. Two-thirds of the physicians in Kentucky are members of this Association and it is estimated that this will be the largest meeting ever held. Especial attention will be given to the Pure Food question, and there will be an extended discussion on diseases of the thyroid gland, and the papers will be read on the latest developments in the treatment of typhoid fever, appendicitis and other diseases. The new opsonic theory of treatment of disease will be explained by a lecture illustrated with a stereopticon.
