## Wright Gets Place.

A meeting of the city council was held Friday night for the purpose of filling the office of Chief of Police, made vacant by the death of Tom Dillon Jr.

There were four or five applicants for the position, and John Wright, who has been on the police force for some time, was given the place. The general consensus of opinion is that the council made no mistake in its selection. Mr. Wright has made an exceptionally good officer—a quiet, sensible, fearless young man—and has the best interests of the town and its people at heart. He will finish the unexpired term of Mr. Dillon, which is about sixteen months.

For some time past Hickman could boast of being the best policed town in this section, and officers Wright and Hamby have been very instrumental in this good work. Not only have we had better order, but the city has collected more money in fines in the past two years than for any five years previous. We predict it will continue.

Until the first of next year, all city taxes will be paid to Mayor Tom Dillon instead of Chief Wright, as it will save paying a third man's salary, and Mr. Wright will have all he can do to look after his street and police duties.

## In Banking Business.

On November 1, the government will get into the banking business—another infringement on a violation of its citizens. Not only this, but they will pay 2 per cent interest on deposits, which means that private banking institutions must also pay interest on time deposits of 3 per cent to get the business. For many years the government has been in the job printing business, giving the printer the hot end of it. It had just as well engage in the grocery and dry goods business, so far as the fairness of it is concerned. The bankers who have been patronizing the government job printing office, (or rather a private office in Ohio which contracts the work from Uncle Sam), will now have about an even break of it with the printer. Now if the banks pay enough taxes to off-set the 2 per cent offered by Uncle Sam on his savings bank business, it ought to make easy sailing for him in his new venture.
