The Dick Fowler lays over today for her regular Sunday rest and leaves for Cairo at 8:30 tomorrow morning.

The John K. Speed did not leave Cincinnati for New Orleans yesterday as was expected. She will leave there today noon and has a big trip.

The H. W. Butterff will arrive tonight from Nashville and leave tomorrow at 10 a. m. for Clarksville.

The J. M. Howell and Russell Lord, both from Cumberland river, arrived here last evening with big trips of ties.

The Joe Fowler is due from Evansville this morning and leaves on return trip tomorrow at 10 a. m.

The Paducah boats, the Hopkins and Fowler, have about solved the rouster problem. It was only solved by the steamboat management coming to the terms of the rousters and

are now paying them \$30 per month and board instead of \$25. As a consequence these boats now have full crews of rousters and are on time.

Local rivermen say that from present indications a good boating stage will be had on the Ohio up until about the middle of July. They expect the longest season they have known for years. Those familiar with river affairs say that it would be advisable for the people at the bottoms to be on the lookout as the Ohio will certainly go out of its banks.

The famous Hudson from Memphis is due today for Cincinnati.

The Charleston, with a big trip, arrived from Tennessee river this morning. She went to Jopra to discharge a lot of lumber for the C. E. and I. railroad.
