WILL GO AFTER HATCH.

Sheriff Regan expects to start for Richmond, Va., about Wednesday to bring Lewellen Van S. Hatch, the alleged defaulting insurance agent back to Butte for trial. He will go to Helena tomorrow after the governor's signature to requisition papers.

LATE LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

Special to the Inter Mountain.

Helena, Jan. 2.—Stephens of Missoula named E. C. Day of Helena as speaker pro tem of the house. He was elected by acclamation. Stephens called for the pleasure of the house. Stephens of Missoula proceeded to read the names agreed upon at the caucus last night and moved their election, as follows:

Speaker, H. C. Stiff, Missoula; speaker pro tem, E. M. Lamb, Silver Bow; chief clerk, Charles R. Craig, Helena; assistant chief clerk, J. M. Kennedy; sergeant-at-arms, Charles Weener, Great Falls; assistant sergeant-at-arms, Martin Leyden, Helena; journal clerk, Frank Longstaff, Missoula; enrolling clerk, Miss Childs, Helena; doorkeeper, George Callahan, Gallatin; day watchman, Ed. Madison, Missoula; Rev. Warren, East Helena; pages, William Flynn, Louis Booker, Frank Gleason, Helena; and Thomas Hughes, Anaconda. The nominations were seconded.

Hedges presented the minority candidates, viz.: Speaker pro tem, A. S. Jaquet, Flathead; chief clerk, F. P. Sterling, Helena; assistant chief clerk, W. R. McDonald, Fergus; sergeant-at-arms, Robert Evans.

Speaker Pro Tem Day called upon Stone of Missoula to act as secretary to record the caucus which was viva voce. Lindsay voted for Stiff and the latter for Lindsay. The vote showed that Stiff and the balance of the caucus nominees had been elected by 58 votes to 10 for the republican nominee.

Hedges and Stephens were appointed a committee to escort Speaker Stiff to the chair. After applause, he briefly thanked the house for the honor, and promised to deal fairly and impartially with all. The oath as speaker was administered and the employees of the house were sworn.

It was noted that J. M. Kennedy did not appear to take the oath as assistant chief clerk.

The rules of the Fifth session will be used until the committee on rules report.

Hedges Toole and Garr were appointed a committee to notify the senate and governor that the house was organized. The house adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow before the committee reported.

Senator Mahan was the only absentee in the senate. A telegram was read from the Valley county man that he will be here soon.

Justice Hunt administered the oaths to the new members.

Senator Hoffman presented the caucus nominees for various offices as follows: Vice president T. P. Cullen; secretary, Dave O'Connor; assistant secretary, F. M. Grant; sergeant-at-arms, J. W. Pomeroy; assistant sergeant-at-arms, J. H. Kelly; enrolling clerk, J. L. De Hart; journal clerk, H. B. Hill; engrossing clerk, Charles Dillon; chaplain, M. L. Rickman; day watch Con Brae; night watch, James Woodste; doorkeeper, Mose Marks; committee-clerks, May Glenn, Katherine Rademaker and Lizzie Hogan.

A committee was read from W. G. Watt, formerly senator from Meagher, who moved out of the district, to the effect that he did not contest Anderson's election. A resolution was passed declaring Anderson the nominee and he was sworn in.

Spriggs appointed as a committee on rules Norris, Clark and McKay. On committee to notify the governor, Holston, Anderson and Connolly. Committee to notify the house, Grenell, Cullen and Worden.

The senate then adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow.


