He was an old timer in Butte, Phillipsburg and Anaconda where he lived about five years each at the two former places, and ten years in this city. The deceased was 39 years of age, a native of Florence, New York.

CHRISTIANSEN FOUND OVER.

The preliminary hearing of A. Christiansen, charged with mayhem, was held in Judge Devine's court, yesterday and the defendant bound over to appear before the district court in the sum of \$1,000 bonds. The complaining witness was James Murphy, who suffered the loss of a portion of his upper lip in the encounter he had with Christiansen on the night of December 9.
