pepper; 1 cupful meat stock or hot
water; 1 teaspoon onion juice.
Remove stock from roasting pan and
make the "brown sauce" in the pan.
Put fat and onion juice in the pan,
and brown them; add the flour and
brown it; then add the other ingredi-
ents and cook as white sauce.
The onions should be cooked in sev-
eral different waters with no cover
over the pan, as cooking them this
way makes them less strong.
White Sauce.
One and one-half tablespoons flour;
1 tablespoon oleomargarine; 1-2 tea-
spoon salt; white pepper; 1-2 cup
milk; 1-2 cup vegetable stock.
Heat the fat; when it bubbles add
flour and salt, mixing thoroughly; add

a small portion of the milk; heat and
stir continually until it thickens; add
another portion of milk and proceed
as before; continue until all the milk
has been added. The sauce is suf-
ficiently cooked when it reaches the
boiling point after the last quantity
has been added.
The thickness of white sauce for
vegetables depends upon the kind of
vegetable. The thinner sauce is gen-
erally more satisfactory with starchy
vegetables.

Tapioca.
Three-quarter cupful pearl tapioca
or 3-8 cupful granulated tapioca; 2 1-2
cupfuls boiling water; 1-2 teaspoonful
salt; 1-2 cupful sugar.
If pearl tapioca is used, cover it
generously with cold water and allow
it to stand one hour or over night.
If granulated tapioca is used, no
cold water is needed. For either gran-
ulated or pearl tapioca, add the boiling
water and salt to the tapioca and cook
over the naked flame and then over
hot water, as in the cooking of break-
fast cereal; cook in double boiler until
transparent; when cooked pour out
into dish and put to cool; when cool
add the sliced banana; serve with
cream and sugar.

HIGH COST OF TWINE HITS U. S. POSTOFFICE

Employees Directed to Use the
Odd Bits to Cut Down
Expenses.

Washington, Jan. 2.—New spare time
employment has been found for the
workers of the postoffice department in
the unraveling of odd bits of twine
that come into the postoffices through-
out the country, and in tying the ends
together to form balls of twine for ty-
ing purposes.
This is the result of a wave of econom-
y in the postoffice department. In
calling attention to the fact that such
spare time employment is given to
idle men in some of the postoffices the
department states: "It is desired that
this work is to be followed throughout
the service and that excess twine
which is accumulated be sent by mail
to the nearest large postoffice or di-
vision headquarters of the railway mail
service."

The department officials state that,
owing to the abnormal increase in the
price of jute twine, a contract for the
supply of which has just been made
for a period of one year from Nov. 1,
1916, it is necessary to emphasize pre-
vious appeals that care and economy
be exercised in the use of twine, and
that it be saved and reused when pos-
sible.

Clerks have been admonished to use
only the amount of twine necessary to
tie securely, and the instructions state
that "once around the length and
twice around the width are sufficient
to hold packages of large size. For
smaller packages, less twine should
suffice."

Postmasters and superintendents of
the railway mail service have been di-
rected to restrict requisitions to the
minimum amounts, and they are to re-
gard the notice to that effect as a
warning, without further explanation,
that the department will be forced to
act accordingly in filling their future
requisitions for twine.
