
ENTIRE CHANGE OF BILL AT EMPRESS TOMORROW

STILL SEEKING MISSING LINK

Police After Absolute Evidence to Connect Suicide With Girl's Murder.

Philadelphia, Jan. 6.—A missing link in the chain of circumstantial evidence forged by the police about Bernard W. Lewis, who committed suicide in an Atlantic City hotel and who the authorities say they are convinced was the slayer of Maizie Colbert, art model, may be supplied today when detectives question a new witness said to have been found.

Despite the damning evidence collected against the Pittsburg man, the police so far admit they have no positive proof that Lewis knew Miss Colbert. Neither have they positive proof that he ever entered the apartments of the girl. Coupled to this is the lack of a known motive.

The detectives say they were informed late last night that an automobile accessory dealer will produce a woman today who was with Maizie Colbert on the night preceding the murder and heard the model talk on the telephone with Lewis, who was at a hotel. Miss Colbert refused to meet the man at first, but later an appointment was made, the police say. It was also stated that this woman can show that Lewis and the model met at an automobile show held here a year ago.

Marie Collins, an intimate friend of Miss Colbert, told the captain of detectives that she never heard her speak of Lewis, although she was acquainted with every man that had visited her chum.

"It always was Maizie's custom," said Miss Collins, "that whenever she had a visitor to telephone me. On Friday morning, however, when I called her up and told her I was not feeling well and invited her to my apartments on the second floor she said she had company. On every occasion she told me the name of the man who was with her in her apartments."

THE BODY OF LEWIS IS TAKEN TO HIS HOME

Pittsburg, Jan. 6.—The body of Bernard W. Lewis, who killed himself in Atlantic City after a warrant had been issued at Philadelphia for his arrest in connection with the murder of Maizie Colbert, reached here today and was taken to the residence of his father, W. A. Lewis. Private funeral services will be held tomorrow.

BAXTER TO FURNISH NEW RIALTO THEATER

Writing tables, lamps, telephone tables, couches, screens and the like are calculated to furnish a home atmosphere decidedly out of the ordinary.

The mezzanine floor is to be finished in blue and silver with restful chairs and divans upholstered with blue covering to harmonize with the general effect. Handsome blue velvet portieres will divide the mezzanine floor from the ladies' retiring and writing rooms.

The men's smoking room will be furnished completely with the idea of comfort and ease ever foremost.

Perival Collins, art director for all the Jensen-Von Herberg theaters, will superintend the work of furnishing and decorating.

CONDUCTORS SEIZE SLEDS FROM BOYS

Two Captured on Emmet Street and Will Be Returned Only to Parents.

Two sleds belonging to boys who were riding on Emmet street on the west side have been taken by street car conductors and are now at the street car office waiting claims by the parents of the children.

DIES IN THE CITY JAIL HAD BEEN BEATEN UP

Thomas Martin's Body Found in Cell Early This Morning. Had Been Drinking.

Thomas Martin, aged about 30 years, died this morning in the city jail. Coroner Lane will investigate the case. According to the authorities death was due to alcoholism. Martin had been beaten up severely prior to his arrest last evening. He had had bruises about the head and face. No relatives have been located as yet. The body was removed to the Sherman & Reed parlors.

ASKS \$10,000 FOR THE DEATH OF LAMUTH LAD

Boy is Alleged to Have Been Killed by Machine Driven by C. Patritte.

Matt Lamuth, as administrator of the estate of Matt Lamuth, Jr., today brought suit against John Patritte and Caesar Patritte, asking for \$10,000 as damages for injuries which resulted in the death of young Lamuth. The complaint states that on June 12, 1916, an automobile which was owned by John Patritte and was being driven by Caesar Patritte as the servant of the owner, ran over young Lamuth at a point near what is known as the old Helme warehouse, in the Meaderville district. It is alleged that the machine was being run at a reckless and dangerous rate of speed and that in running the boy down injuries were inflicted which resulted in his death in about one minute. The complaint says that the boy was strong and healthy and that a fair compensation for the loss sustained by his death would be \$10,000, for which amount judgment is asked.
