
PRESIDENT OF CRUCIBLE STEEL COMPANY IS DEAD

Up and Down the State

Workmen unearthed what is supposed to be a large tusk of a mastodon while excavating near Forsyth. What was left of the tusk was about eight inches in diameter and a foot and a half long. It became very hard after exposure, somewhat like ivory.

The Northwestern Mill Construction company is planning on erecting a flour mill at Pocatello. It is said that a mill which will produce 25 barrels of flour a day can be built for \$10,000.

The chamber of commerce of Pocatello has been reorganized with a large membership which has promised faithful attendance. The club was organized a couple of years ago but became inactive because the members failed to attend.

A heard of 30 cattle, while crowding across a stream near Dodson, broke through the ice and all were drowned. They belonged to Dan Nicholson.

The Polson lodge of Masons which was recently organized has a charter membership of 30. The first banquet was held Tuesday evening with many members from neighboring lodges attending.

Drummond farmers have formed a branch of the American Society of Equity. It will be affiliated with the Missoula branch.

A powwow of the Assiniboine Indians will be held at Wolfe Point next Monday. The provisions in a treaty said to have been made 60 years ago will be taken up and delegates appointed to go to Washington to press their claims for certain lands along the Missouri.

Actual construction work on the Dixon community building is now under way. The building will be 86x35 feet with a 14-foot ceiling.
