

ST NOTES SEEM TO BRING NO HOPE FOR AN EARLY END OF THE WAR

President and Cabinet today determining opportunity for further move toward peace.

Diplomats Who Have Heretofore Been Optimistic Declare Germany Can Never Meet Conditions of Peace Laid Down in the Entente Reply to President Wilson

Washington, Jan. 12.—President Wilson today began an examination of the entente's reply to his peace note on his part and in what way one may be achieved.

The cabinet meeting the peace note was discussed only in general terms, but afterward Secretary Lansing remained for a conference with the president and it was then that they went over the entente note.

Among the courses of action he before the president is another note to Germany to state specific conditions which the allies have done.

Diplomats Gloomy. Diplomats here were gloomy over their denunciation of the German note and their declarations that the note was more severe than they had been led to expect.

Democratic Majority of Rules Committee Reported Against Further Inquiry.

MINORITY CONTENDED THAT EVIDENCE EXISTS

Committee Reports.

HOUSE CONFORMS TO SENATE IDEA OF TAX INQUIRY

Concludes to Confine Investigation to Classes Named in Senate Resolution.

COMMITTEES WILL ACT TOGETHER IN MATTER

McMahon Protests Against the Change—Steering Committee to Be Done Away With.

Helena, Jan. 12.—By a vote of 60 to 29 the house today reconsidered the vote by which yesterday it passed the White resolution in respect to a tax inquiry. It then adopted a resolution directing a special committee to be named by the house to act with the senate in the matter of the tax investigation and to confine the inquiry to those classes of property named in the senate resolution.

In effect this means that the inquiry in the matter of taxes will relate entirely to the property of mines, smelters, telegraph and telephone companies, water power concerns and the like. The charge was made by McMahon of Silver Bow, who opposed the resolution, that it was aimed at the mining industry, but despite his protest, the proposal carried.

Moves to Reconsider.

Representative White moved the reconsideration. McMahon objected, but reconsideration was ordered. White then presented his new resolution, to which McMahon offered an amendment restoring the clause that contemplated an inquiry into all classes of property. McMahon in support of the amendment said that it was unfair to discriminate against the interests of the state. He charged that the resolution was aimed at the mining industry. He believed it wrong to attack one industry when inequalities of taxation admittedly were found in all parts of the state.

Blake of Deer Lodge spoke on the same lines. He protested against an inquiry that was limited in scope. He thought that the examination should
