NEW GOLF RULE TO BAR MANY PLAYERS

National Committee Accepts New Definition of an "Amateur."

New York, Jan. 12.—Several golfers of national reputation will be driven from amateur ranks by the application of a new definition of an amateur approved early today at the annual meeting of the United States Golf Association.

The meeting also sustained the rule under which Francis Ouimet, Paul Taylor and J. H. Sullivan, Jr., of the Woodland (Massachusetts) Golf Club were deprived of their amateur standing.

A motion for a direct vote on the action of the executive committee in withdrawing the Woodland club from membership and calling on the Woodland club to withdraw their names from the handicap list of the Massachusetts Golf Association was ruled out of order.

The main question before the committee was whether the Woodland club should be expelled from membership and whether the club should be allowed to remain in membership as an amateur.

After a spirited debate the delegates by 39 to 12 upheld a report of the executive committee charging the Woodland club with the violation of the definition of an amateur.

The report stated: "The new wording is used simply for the purpose of greater clarity and to avoid any impression that membership is intended between amateur and professional players accepting or holding any position as agent or employee that involves as part of its duties the teaching of golf to a person or the playing of golf for a person who is not a member of the club."

It will also be noted that the new definition of an amateur is intended to cover the case of a player who is employed by a club as a caddy or as a professional player.
