WORLD LOST ITS GREATEST ACTOR WHEN TOM LAWSON WENT INTO WALL ST. GAME

That is the Declaration of C. E. Russell, Who Saw the Famous Frenzied Financier Giving His Testimony Before the House Rules Committee at Its First Hearing Into the "Leak" Charges.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The world lost its greatest play actor when Thomas W. Lawson went into stocks and advertisements. In the way of character comedy, he could make any other actor look like a piker.

The caucus room, which is nobody's boudoir or cozy corner, was jammed, people standing on chairs, all eyes fixed on him, breathless attention and all that, the committee glaring at him and firing the questions like a machine gun, and he sat there and played horse with them all and never showed the least concern nor the slightest excitement except when he manufactured it for his own purposes.

Whenever he seemed to be getting mad it was evident a moment later that he was merely play acting again. When he got off one of his jokes he never allowed the ghost of a smile to appear on his face; it was only by closest watching that you could see a tinkle of his little eyes under the dense thickets of his eyebrows.

When he was making his statement to the committee he stood with his face a little lifted and his eyes fixed at regular intervals on the wall as if like an elder at a prayer meeting. Like the elder, also, he would from time to time raise his eyebrows and drop his voice. Only those that know him well saw that he was having a bully old time, savoring those 11 members of congress and making them look like simple minded comers.

In the midst of which pious performance he would occasionally glance over to the spectators who were seated in the gallery, and he would sit an old newspaperman that he used to know very well and then just a suggestion of a gratified sense of humor would appear around his eyes. But you couldn't say at any time that his face changed. It was all the time like a fine mask, and the color in it never varied by a shade. Even when the committee was about to have him committed for contempt he appeared like a person only remotely interested. He leaned back in his chair and, with an air of complete resignation, studied the ceiling like one much bored and waiting for the committee to become interesting again.

"Mr. Lawson!—Mr. Lawson!—Mr. Lawson!—Mr. Lawson!" cries the chairman poor Mr. Henry, in a vain attempt to make some impression on the witness. He may as well keep still without the slightest hesitation; the Lawson stream flows on, rising

higher and higher as if the man were really angry, until everybody else quits and he is left talking alone and declaring his fixed and unalterable purpose to defend the rights of an American citizen and the births of freemen!

He has the most amazing command of himself, his voice, his nerves and his manner. When he had thoroughly angered the committee and aroused the whole audience against him, causing it to denounce him under its breath as a four-flusher and all that, he was still perfectly cool, steady and deliberate. He held a little slip of paper in his hand and it never trembled. After a scorching question fired at him by a committeeman, red faced with wrath, he would stop for half a moment, and then make a slow, long drawn out, coolly framed answer that was no answer and merely made the committeeman hotter than ever.

CORONER IS PROBING DEATH OF SCHULTZ

Inquest Into Death of Ranch Fire Victim Tomorrow Afternoon.

While there is nothing to give hint that John Schultz, the farm hand whose body was found in the smoldering ruins of the Lone Tree ranch house near Silver Bow Sunday morning, was the victim of foul play, Coroner Lane is making a thorough investigation of the case and will hold an inquest tomorrow afternoon at his office in the courthouse.

The fire at the ranch house was discovered by Fred Miles and Vic Carson, who live on the Thomas Miles ranch, some distance away. The two were returning from a dance about 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning, and when they reached the Lone Tree ranch they found the house burned to the ground and Schultz's body, burned to a crisp, in the ruins. They reported the fire to the sheriff and coroner. The two men devoted their efforts to preventing spread of the flames. The fire apparently had been burning for at least an hour. It is the theory of those familiar with the affair that the fire started while Schultz was asleep and that he was overcome by smoke.
