MAY FALL BACK ON THE TARIFF

Democrats Forced to Consider That Means of Raising Revenue. Washington, Jan. 17.—One of the most interesting developments in connection with plans to raise revenues to meet the enormous demands of the treasury is a sentiment that is growing among democratic members of the ways and means committee in favor of falling back on the tariff.

The plan now to use the tariff to pull the nation out of a big threatened deficit already has the support of several democratic members of the ways and means committee and is being seriously considered. The proposition is this: To place a flat tariff of 10 per cent on all articles now on the free list and a flat tariff of 5 per cent increase on all articles now on the dutiable list.

It is calculated that by this simple expedient enough revenue could be raised to meet all of the requirements of the government. The subject is being approached with a good deal of trepidation solely because of apprehension that a resort to a system of tariff taxation by the party that has traditionally opposed protection might have a political effect that would be prejudicial to democratic interests.

When the ways and means committee gets busy on the revenue bill it will have before it the figures of the treasury experts showing how as much as \$700,000,000 of extra revenue may be obtained through a few changes in the present laws.

Undoubtedly the most interesting suggestion made by these experts has been the imposition of an excess profits tax which is estimated, would produce \$200,000,000 of revenue annually. This tax would be imposed on all profits of any corporation, partnership, stock company, etc., which are in excess of 8 per cent. The tax would amount to 5 per cent of these extra profits. So far as is known, such a tax never before has been seriously considered in the United States.

In addition to this proposed tax, scores of other ways of meeting the threatened deficit in the treasury have been figured out by the treasury experts. Among other things, they propose a tax on copper, pig iron, petroleum, aluminum, which would yield \$1,000,000 a year. Then, the restoration of the emergency stamp taxes would yield \$49,000,000 a year. Of course they could not be put back without a storm of protest and the congress is not likely to consider that proposal seriously.

A movement to reorganize sons of veterans in this city was started yesterday by Al Hauswirth, son of a well known veteran, Simon Hauswirth, and A. A. Dockstader, city clerk and another son of a veteran. The two men plan to call a meeting of the organization within a few days and to make plans for a big meeting on Memorial day.

"We plan to make a permanent organization," declared Mr. Hauswirth. "There are several hundred sons of veterans in this city and we should have been organized long ago. The old fellows are dying off each year until now there is a mere handful left. Some one must remain to continue the observance of Memorial day and to see that the great deeds of the men of '61 are not forgotten."

"Then, too, it won't hurt Butte any to have an organization for the promotion of patriotism. We will have meetings once a month and an annual affair on Memorial day."

"All sons of veterans will be eligible when they present their father's discharge from the army or proper proof that their fathers fought in the civil war."
