## WILSON URGES AGREEMENT ON WATER MEASURE

### President Makes Trip to the Capitol to Interview Legislators.

Washington, Jan. 18.—President Wilson went to the capitol today and conferred in his room there with senators on the water power legislation which he is anxious to have passed at this session of congress. One of the first he talked with was Senator Bankhead. Yesterday he conferred with house leaders and indicated he would call a conference of senators and representatives interested in the legislation.

There are some radical differences to be adjusted in the water power legislation now being framed.

Later the president talked with Representative Adamson.

#### His Purpose.

"I just came up to gather together a few odds and ends," the president told the newspaper men as he left. "It was nothing about Europe or peace or anything like that. I am interested in the general dam bill."

He said he did not care to say whether he favored the house or senate bill and remarked:

"I am interested in seeing the conferees get together."

The senate and house each have passed bills to open up development on navigable streams, and a conference committee has been trying to agree since last July.

The president was said today not to have expressed a preference for either bill, but urged adoption of some legislation and also the passage of the Walsh bill now before the senate which would open up water power development on public lands.

## COMPANY'S STOCK DEALS DESCRIBED AT TRIAL

sent a reply by registered mail that he would refuse to be a director.

#### Paid Rent With Stock.

He said when the company moved out of his office they gave Mr. Burlingame and himself 19 shares of stock each in payment for the use of the office. The witness said he sold his stock the next day for \$100.

Louis Newman said he was the present president of the company and had been since last September after the indictments had been returned against the present defendants. Prior to that time he had held 19 shares of the stock and had been elected a director, but did not serve. He said upon his election as director he took advantage of the occasion to look at the books and found the company was running advertisements to the effect that 400,000 shares of stock had been subscribed, but there was only \$7,000 in the treasury. He said that after he saw the books he decided not to act.

#### Present Resources \$72,000.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Galen he said the Northwestern Trust company was now a going concern and had resources amounting to \$72,000 and was preparing to build an apartment house in Great Falls. He also testified that in making up the list of the resources the company had eliminated a lot of promissory notes which, if they had been included, would have brought the resources up to about \$107,000. These notes, he said, were eliminated because of the probability that lax suits might have to be started to collect on them.

#### Stockholder on Stand.

Mrs. Alice M. Descelles of Havre, a witness for the government who is prominently mentioned in the indictment as the party to whom many letters were addressed by the company, took the stand late yesterday afternoon and identified form letters, circulars and bulletins making representations concerning the company, which she said were sent to her.

She testified that she purchased \$5,000 worth of stock in the company from Henry A. Meyer, a former hotel man and formerly director of the company. Her husband, she said, purchased \$2,500 worth of the stock. None of the defendants, however, had any part in negotiating these transactions, she declared.

## BURLESON JOINS LEAK COMMITTEE CONFERENCE

Other New York financiers, who appeared yesterday in response to subpoenas, were permitted to return home by the order of the committee under direction to come to Washington at once if summoned.

The conference developed that strong administration forces were at work to have Samuel Untermyer chosen. Two democrats were reported to have urged his selection.

Opposition to Untermyer as counsel has arisen both in the committee and on the floor of the house. Yesterday, during the debate, those who opposed him pointed out that he recently took a trip to South America with Secretary McAdoo as a personal guest.

The conference broke up without deciding anything.

#### Republicans Astonished.

Representative Campbell, ranking minority members were surprised on arriving at the hearing room to find a placard on the door announcing that the hearings had been indefinitely postponed. Republican of the committee, after a conference with his colleagues and with Republican Leader Mann, issued a statement assailing the democratic members for seeking to agree upon counsel without consulting republican members. #### Lansing's Statement.

Secretary Lansing today denied statements made at the "leak" hearing that he had breakfasted several times at the Biltmore hotel in New York with Bernard Baruch. He said he did not know Mr. Baruch and never had any conversations with him.

Secretary Lansing's authorized statement was as follows:

"While I dislike very much to dignify by denial false and malicious scandal, at the same time the publicity which has been given to some of the reports warrants me in saying in regard to the statements that I breakfasted several times with Mr. Baruch at the Biltmore hotel, implying, I assume, that I gave him advance information concerning the note to the belligerents, I never to my knowledge saw Mr. Baruch at any time. I do not know him and never had any conversations with him, and I have been out of Washington only once since election and that was to attend the Army and Navy game in New York Nov. 25."

## VESSEL FORCED TO TRAIL A SUBMARINE FOR DAYS

### She Takes on Crews of Three Ships Sent Down by the Submersible.

London, Jan. 18.—Lloyds announced that the British steamer Auchenchrach, 3,916 tons, the sailing ship Kinpuruss and the Danish steamer Omsk, 1,574 tons, had been sunk.

It was also announced that the German steamer of 1,574 tons had been sent to the bottom.

A steamer has arrived in port with 84 members of the crews of the Auchenchrach, Omsk and Kinpuruss. The steamer was forced to follow the German submarine from Jan. 13 to Jan. 16, when the vessel was ordered to discharge her cargo.

With the exception of four members of the crew of the Auchenchrach, the crews of the vessels sunk were saved.
