MONTANA ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Estimated That Fergus County Will Yield \$30,000,000 in 1917.

Lewistown, Jan. 19.—An estimate of a \$30,000,000 income in Fergus county during 1917 from grain, cattle and minerals is the figure placed yesterday by Carl H. Peterson, county agriculturist. About 400,000 acres of winter wheat has been planted. About 100,000 acres will be planted in spring wheat. A yield of 10,000,000 bushels of wheat will come during the year. The wheat crop will be worth in excess of \$15,000,000.

FOR FULL VALUE.

Great Falls, Jan. 19.—At yesterday's session of county assessors, J. J. Ryan, secretary of the state board of equalization, made an address advocating assessments upon full cash values. Mr. Ryan declared that such is the law and said the law should be obeyed. He anticipates the support of the attorney general.

DENIED BY RELATIVES.

Coburg, Jan. 19.—Relatives of John T. Daly, an aged homesteader who died here yesterday, have refused to have anything to do with the old man's burial. A telegram received yesterday instructed the coroner to bury Daly in Coburg. Actuated by the heartlessness of relatives, the Chamber of Commerce here has taken up a collection and will give the deceased homesteader a decent burial.

WANT QUICK ACTION.

Helena, Jan. 19.—The Montana Federation of Churches, in session here, yesterday went on record for a prohibition law making the state dry on Dec. 31, 1917, instead of a year later, as the referendum passed last November provides.

MINERS WANT RAISE.
