Brothers Drop Felix Mudro and He Organizes a bunch of Fast Bowlers.

Another bowling team, which will contest with the Mudro Grills for the championship of the city, has been organized, with Felix Mudro as captain, Harry Thomas as manager and with the Washington Markets as the name. Other members of the team are John Jovic, E. Anderson, John Pascoe and M. Lorenz. The newly organized five will enter the state tournament in Anaconda and will probably join the crowd in Portland during the big coast tournament.

Felix Mudro is considered as good as his brothers, Joe and Charley, the mainstays of the Mudro Grills. He was kicked off, however, for no other reason than that Joe thought those were "too many Mudros." Felix got sore and organized a team of his own, which he says will clean up on the Mudro Grills before the season is over. Rumors that a new bowling alley will be built here within the next two or three months are current in Butte. Efforts are to be made to secure the next annual state tournament for this city.

MANY IN REVOLT AGAINST CARRANZA

Villa, Zapata, Diaz and Robles All Head Independent Rebel Forces.

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 22.—About half a dozen well-armed rebel bands are now operating in Mexico with very little in common except hostility toward the de facto government, persons of long and intimate acquaintance with Mexican affairs say. Sometimes a fictitious unity is even thrown through some paper party such as the "Federalists." But the federalists themselves disclaim any connection with any faction, saying that their aim is not a military one but to work out a plan for a united Mexico. They express willingness to support the Carranza government if a free civil government is re-established and constitutional guarantees that have been suspended by martial law are restored.

Francisco Villa is considered by northern military critics as the ablest fighter among the revolutionary chiefs, both by reason of his ability in the field and his hold on his followers. No other leader has succeeded in making the Mexican, who likes to fight from behind rocks or at long range, charge the enemy lines. He introduced hand grenade attacks before the outbreak of the European war. Villa's political program, according to his proclamations, is confined mostly to the idea of driving out foreigners, particularly the Syrians and Chinese who intermarry with the Mexicans. His hatred of Americans, it is said by his old friends here, would disappear in case of American forgiveness and recognition if he should prove successful in northern Mexico against Carranza.

The Zapata Movement. Zapata, who operated in Morelos, south of Mexico City, bases his cause on agrarian reforms. His state is largely owned by about ten landlords, most of them Spaniards. He has declared that he will support no government that does not equalize land holdings. On the military side, Zapata is regarded as weak. He has no army, but a kind of militia that gathers together, makes some raid and then quietly returns to work in the fields in time to greet the punitive expedition. He keeps some outposts employed, however, and did make an organized stand at Cuernavaca and a few other points. Zapata's followers believe he is invulnerable, much as Aguinaldo was regarded by the Filipinos during his insurrection after the Spanish war. He has been generous to the poor, but has tortured members of the landlord class with unpeppering barbarities.


Felix Diaz, although regarded as a liberal in the time of his uncle, President Diaz, now is said to favor certain interests that prospered during the Diaz regime. His operations have been confined to the Guatemala border, and from time to time have been swelled by rumor to large proportions. Jose Yaaqui Robles, according to his own report of operations in Oaxaca received here recently, seems to have moved in the backwoods there without accomplishing much of importance. Rumors out of Mexico had him selling Puebla and other large cities of the south, but these have been disproved. He is said to be unaligned politically, and little is known of his purposes.

Robles, after being paroled a year or two ago by Villa on condition of withdrawing from Mexican politics, came to El Paso. After Villa's attack on Columbus he offered to act as guide for Pershing against Villa. This was not accepted, so he joined the Carranza party through the mediation of General Trevino. He accepted a commission, induced guerilla bands to accept amnesty, then had a falling out with General Obregon and started a revolution of his own. Some of the small bands are attached in a general way with the latter, but many of them are out for banditry, using politics as an excuse for looting.

IS CHARGED WITH MURDER OF FLEGG

Fred Wilson Must Answer for Shooting in Majestic Saloon.

In an information filed by County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson in Judge Dwyer's department of the district court today, Fred Wilson, a machinist, is charged with the crime of murder in having shot and killed Leonard Flegg, a bartender. The shooting occurred near midnight on the night of Jan. 19, just as Flegg was walking out of the Majestic saloon, 135 East Park street. According to the information in the possession of the authorities the two men had had some trouble and Wilson pulled a gun and fired five shots, three of the bullets entering the body of Flegg. He died instantly.

Ray Enaley and Harold McBride, the two boys who were before Judge Dwyer last week charged with grand larceny and who both entered pleas of guilty, were present in court this morning for sentence. McBride withdrew his former plea of guilty and entered a plea of not guilty, while Ray Enaley stood by his former plea of guilty and was sent to the State Reform school at Miles City until he reaches the age of 21 or is sooner paroled by the proper authorities. McBride will be given a trial within a short time.

Frank Moran was arraigned on a charge of robbery and being without means to employ an attorney A. C. McDaniel was appointed to defend him and his time for plea was fixed for next Wednesday.

ROADHOUSES FAIL TO HEED WARNING

Proprietors of Five Resorts Arrested—Complaints Are Filed Today.

Notwithstanding the warning given to the roadhouses a short time ago as to the proper observance of the law, a visit to those resorts early yesterday morning by Undersheriff Jack Mella and a number of his deputies found no less than five places open in violation of the law. Evidence was secured against all of them and in addition the owners of the resorts were arrested and brought to the county jail. Today County Attorney Jackson filed complaints in justice courts against Frank Cash, Mrs. Oberg of the Bungalow, Lucille O'Neill and Mrs. Fitzpatrick's place as a result of the raids.

Undersheriff Jack Mella with Deputies A. D. Arel, Joe Christ, D. J. O'Connor and P. J. Carroll left the courthouse shortly after midnight yesterday morning. After the warning which had been given to the proprietors of the roadhouses by Undersheriff Mella a week ago as to a strict observance of the law, it was expected the owners of the places would not take any chance, but the officers found that after midnight when everything was expected to be closed, little respect was being shown for the law. It was near 12:30 o'clock yesterday morning when the officers drew up in front of the Five Mile. Here they found two men and three women in the dance hall, but there was no indication that liquor was being sold in violation of the law. This situation was reported to the county attorney, Frank Cash, the proprietor, was not arrested.

The next place visited was the establishment of Mrs. Perie, and although there is no license to sell liquor at the house a man was found drinking whiskey and a girl soda at the bar. Perie was placed under arrest and two bottles of whiskey were brought along as evidence of violation of the law.

The Bungalow was also found to be open in violation of the law and nine men and eight women were discovered in the place. The proprietress, Mrs. Oberg, was arrested and brought to the county jail, charged with allowing her dance hall to be in operation. It is only a few days ago that Mrs. Oberg was arrested on a similar charge, which is still pending in a justice court.

Lucille's place was found to contain two men and two women in private rooms and, according to the officers, there were lots of evidence secured as to the character of the place. Lucille was placed in the county jail. At the O'Neill roadhouse five girls and two men were found and the proprietress was taken into custody.

PLANS TO SAVE IOWANS MILLIONS IN EGGS ALONE

McGregor, Ia.—By a campaign of education W. B. Barney, dairy commissioner of Iowa, plans to save a million dollars worth of eggs to the consumer next year.

Iowa has an annual egg crop of \$20,000,000. Of this amount Mr. Barney says about \$1,000,000 worth is lost each year in getting the products to market, due to lack of knowledge of the farmers and egg dealers of proper ways of handling them.

Next summer Mr. Barney will have the use of a special car and equipment, and will tour the state, teaching the farmers and dealers how to avoid this million dollar loss.

WILLIAM SKYRME ILL.

William Skyrme, one of the old-time mining men of Butte, and for years superintendent of the Anaconda mines, is seriously ill in San Francisco and it is doubtful if he will recover, according to word received in the city.

Mr. Skyrme is one of the mining men of the early days of the west and was superintendent of the famous Comstock lode, which brought Nevada into prominence as a gold state. He was controlled by Mackay and Fairbank. Mr. Skyrme came here when Marcus Daly began extensive mining operations in Butte. Mr. Skyrme left Butte a few years ago to make his home in California because of his health. George Masel, a nephew, left for San Francisco.

HOWARD STONE DEAD.

Howard Stone, 1126 Oregon avenue, died Saturday in Long Beach, Cal., according to word received in the city by relatives. Mr. and Mrs. Stone left here two weeks ago for a trip to California for the benefit of the health. As Mrs. Stone's condition will not permit her making the return journey at once, Mr. Stone's body will be placed in a vault and will be brought to Butte for burial later. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Dick Williams and Miss Bessie Stone; a son, Charles Stone, all of Butte. Mr. Stone was well known in the city. He was well known in Boroman also, where he made his home for several years.

CHARLES VALLMER DEAD.

Charles Vallmer, aged 21 years, employed by the East Butte Mining company at Lime Spur, east of Butte, died last evening in a local hospital from an attack of pneumonia. He is survived by his mother, who is a resident of Ohio. The body was removed to the Sherman & Reed parlors, where it will be held until word is received from his mother regarding the funeral.

PROTESTING AGAINST GRAZING FEE RAISE

Stockmen of Nation. Gathered at Cheyenne, Meet Secretary Houston.

Dr. John A. Donovan, a well known Butte physician and surgeon who has livestock interests in the southern part of the state, appeared with a committee of stockmen before Secretary of Agriculture David F. Houston at Cheyenne, Wyo., last week to protest against an increase of grazing fees in national forests. The protest was incident to the meeting of the American Live Stock association, which commenced its sessions Wednesday at Cheyenne.

The proposal to increase national forest grazing fees was made by A. F. Potter, associate forester of the United States biological survey, and Ogden Armour, the Chicago packer. Montana was represented by about 20 cattle and sheep men among them Wallace Hudekoper of Wallis; Dr. Donovan, D. C. Wenzell, C. C. Collins, Lewis Ballerick, W. B. George, D. G. Brown, S. N. Masey and George B. Frank.

ASKS \$5,200 DAMAGES FOR DEATH OF HIS SON

Joseph Jonosky Brings Suit Against Northern Pacific Railway Company.

A damage suit was filed with the clerk of the district court in behalf of Joseph Jonosky by Attorneys William and Harry Meyer against the Northern Pacific Railroad company, asking for \$5,200 as damages for the loss of the 9-year-old son of the plaintiff through being run over and killed by a train of cars of the company.

The accident occurred at the Coltonia avenue railroad crossing, where it is alleged a train of freight cars had stopped and blocked the pathway which it was customary for persons to use. The boy crawled under the cars and while he was under one of the cars, the train was started. It is alleged that the train was started without warning and that no care was exercised by the railroad employees to prevent an accident.
