SHOPLIFTERS GET LONG SENTENCES J. Connolly and J. Carney Go to County Jail for 90 Days. As an object lesson to shoplifters who have been making the rounds of the Butte department stores, Judge P. J. Whitty this afternoon sent John Connolly and John Carney to the county jail for 90 days. Both men entered pleas of guilty. The pair entered the Connell store yesterday afternoon and asked to be shown some overcoats. One was caught while stuffing two short coats under a long coat he was wearing. The clerk called Mr. Coleman, who summoned the police. The police intend to be severe on all shoplifters in the future. During the year, it is said, thousands of dollars worth of goods has been stolen from the big stores. In many cases women have been released without prosecution. Greater severity will be exercised in the future. According to Chief Detective Ed Morrissey, Connolly and Carney have been old offenders. Both men have served terms in the county jail, and the police believe both have made their livings by stealing stuff from the department stores.

ANOTHER EFFORT TO OUST NURSE New Injunction Suit Filed to Prevent Payment of Salary to School Nurse. Another effort is to be made to oust Alice B. Scollard from the position of nurse of the public schools on the ground that she does not hold a license as a nurse or a certificate of registration as required under the state law. In a suit brought in the name of Rebecca Evans this afternoon and filed with the clerk of the district court, the court is asked to restrain John J. Harrington as county treasurer, the clerk of the school board and the board of school trustees from paying the salary of the nurse for the month of January. Attorneys Walker and Walker represent the plaintiff.

BRYAN NOT IN ACCORD WITH WILSON VIEWS Says It's Inconceivable U. Forces Would Act as Europe's Behest. Madison, Wis., Jan. 23.—The president's message is a wonderfully eloquent appeal to the nations at large, declared William Jennings Bryan in an interview here today before leaving on a train for Springfield, Ill., where he speaks this afternoon. "In so far as the president's message suggests terms of agreement, it is entirely sound and reflects what I believe to be an almost unanimous sentiment. But I dissent entirely from the proposition that this nation should join in a movement to effect peace in Europe. "If I know the sentiment of the American people it is inconceivable that they had been willing to put an American army and navy at the command of an international council which would necessarily be controlled by European nations and allow the council to decide for us, when we would go to war. "In the president's appeal he presents the philosophy of brotherhood and co-operation and this is in accordance with the proposition that I am backed up by a larger display of force. In other words, the president has shown in what the approval I hope that the senate will approve the wheat and reject the tariff."
