In Butte thefts of machines are reported to the police and to the sheriff's office almost daily, and the aggregate loss in Silver Bow county from this cause amounts annually to a sum that is large in the aggregate.

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GRAYSON'S REWARD

On the same day that they reported the funeral of the late Admiral Dewey, some of the newspapers of the country carried the announcement that it was Senator Jones of Washington who held up the confirmation of the president's appointment of Dr. Cary T. Grayson to be rear admiral and medical director of the navy.

From many of President Wilson's staunch supporters comes strong criticism of his favoritism.

World adds, "in the principle of selection, and every officer will have a right to feel that his advancement depends upon the personal influence that he wields at the white house or in quar-

ters that command favor at the white house."

The New York Sun charges that the Grayson nomination was sent to the senate with orders to rush it through. It finds that to accomplish the proposed remarkable promotion of Dr. Grayson, an examining board to pass upon him has been hand-picked in advance.

Dr. Grayson entered the service in 1894 and is now thirty-eight years old. Sea Power, the organ of the Navy League, in an editorial in its February number, just out, says that Grayson's most arduous duty in his twelve years of service "has been carrying the white house shawl strap."

Most Americans will agree with the president's critics in this matter. If Senator Jones can prevent the confirmation of the appointment, he will perform a service to his country.

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
