### OMNIBUS MEASURE HASN'T A CHANCE

Senator Kern Says Building Bill Cannot Get Out of Committee.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Munsey Building. Washington, Jan. 25.—The doom of the omnibus public building bill, which contains appropriations for a number of cities in Montana, including Butte, was sounded today by Senator John W. Kern of Indiana, democratic leader of the senate.

"The bill does not have the faintest sort of a show of passing the senate," said Senator Kern. "It will not get out of the senate committee on public buildings and grounds to which it will be referred after passing the house. I have not seen a single senator who is in favor of its passage."

"Is the opposition in the senate based on the character of the measure or on the belief that this is not a time to pass legislation imposing a heavy burden on the treasury?"

"It is based on both," said the senate leader. "I do not know of any senator who favors at this time a pork barrel measure made up as this bill is, or who believes that, even if the bill were framed strictly on merit, there is any occasion or excuse for passing an omnibus building bill now when the office of supervising architect of the treasury is two years behind in the construction of buildings heretofore authorized. There may be some senators who take this view but I have not found them and I am certain they are in a very small minority, if there are any at all. As I already have stated the bill does not stand any show at all in the senate."

Inasmuch as all bills will die at the close of the present congress on March 4 it is assumed, if Senator Kern's canvass of the situation proves correct, that the omnibus building bill will die in committee on that date.

### ITALIAN MAY BECOME RULER OF GREECE



The people of Greece may be subject to the rule of an Italian, the Duke of Aosta who, it is reported, may be placed on the Greek throne by the allies, if they dethrone King Constantine. The duke is a cousin of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy.

### FRENCH RESTAURANTS MUST CUT THE MENUS

Paris, Jan. 25.—France today followed the example of England and Italy in restricting meals in restaurants. Dinner in restaurants are hereafter restricted to hors d'oeuvres, or soup, two other dishes and cheese or dessert. In regard to the two main dishes, the bill of fare, instead of the 60 or 70 items usually presented, is limited to a maximum of nine. The nine consists of one egg dish, three meat and three vegetable.

Public opinion generally recognizes the importance of stopping the waste in food.

The decree was printed in the Official Journal today but does not come into effect until Feb. 15. Management must submit bills of fare each day to the police authorities.

### QUAIL IN MINNESOTA ARE SUFFERING FROM STORM

Winona, Minn., Jan. 25.—The heavy blanket of snow over southern Minnesota has covered the food of the birds and thousands are dying of starvation. Feed will be distributed free to any person who will assist in feeding quail during the present severe weather.

### SLANG BOOKS FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

As a means of aiding foreign students attending American schools and colleges to adapt themselves more readily to the customs in this country, student bodies in several universities have issued small handbooks containing lists of useful English idioms, slang expressions and other pointers which, they say, guard foreigners against making many mistakes.





### MEN ARE NEVER IN DANGER FROM MOOSE, SAYS GUIDE

Bangor, Maine, Jan. 25.—According to Ben York, a famous hunter and guide in Maine for 60 years, no moose ever was known to "tree" a man in

the sense in which the term is generally understood, numerous reports to the contrary being fables or at best exaggerations.

"In my day," said Ben York, "I have seen thousands of moose and killed hundreds of them. I have followed them days and nights, at all seasons. I have watched them for days at a time to learn their tricks; I have kept them in fenced enclosures near my camp for years at a time, and have tamed and driven them to harness all along the West Branch. More than all this, I have questioned reliable hunters and woodsmen who were alive and active in Maine as there are hedgehogs now, and I have never known or learned from any reliable source of a single instance of a human being being 'treed' by one of the animals.

"During the mating season," says York, "the bulls act very strangely at times, rushing about in an aimless manner, climbing steep hills, swimming furious streams and placing themselves in peril of their lives in many ways. While the fury for combat is on an old bull he will crash through the woods and trees and often injure himself seriously. If a man

should get in the bull's way at such a time, why, very likely he would become a candidate for the hospital. At such a time the bull never stops to note how much damage he has done. He keeps racing right along at top speed until he gets all fagged out or meets a rival for the object of his affections.

"The stories that some guides tell," said York, "about moose driving hunters into trees and standing guard over them all night, pawing the ground and bellowing with rage, are inventions of nature fakirs to awe greenhorns. I am convinced that no moose ever deliberately attacked a human being, unless which condition the meekest of animals often become dangerous; and moose at any time or under any circumstances is drawing upon his imagination.

"I have seen two bull moose fight," he says, "while I stood within a few rods of them, and keep up the battle for half an hour without becoming aware of my presence. At other times I have paddled up to a mother moose when she was feeding on the roots of trees, and drawn off a half pint of her milk without alarming her. I have seen and have observed their extreme solicitude for their young; but never yet have I seen or known of a moose treating a human being.

"While I'm talking about moose," York said, "I want to say that I take

no stock in the so-called moosehorn for calling bulls to their destruction in the mating season. The cow moose, whose cry is said to be closely imitated by the birch bark horn, utters a long and dolorous wail at times, whatever the time of year. I have stood close by several times while cow moose were making such cries, but never knew a bull to respond, although I have waited for hours. All through the mating season the bulls are very alert to catch the slightest sound, and let a twig snap or an axe handle beat a tattoo on a hollow stump and the bull is away in the direction of the sound, bellowing his defiant challenge. I have used the birch bark horn with some success in calling moose, but have done as well or better by rapping the butt of my rifle against the trunk of a tree or breaking a twig in a thicket. It is my belief that the dominant passion in the mind of a bull moose in mating time is to meet and defeat every rival, and that the dolorous cry of the cow neither attracts nor repels the male."

Many of the oldest hunters and guides agree with Mr. York concerning the treating of men by moose, but most of them believe that the birch bark horn is very useful to the hunter.

### GOES TO PRISON FOR FAILURE TO PROVIDE PROPER FIRE ESCAPE

New York, Jan. 25.—Asserting that a sentence in prison should teach a far-reaching lesson to factory owners and tenants who fail to provide proper fire exits, Supreme Court Justice Kapper today sent Samuel Barkin to Sing Sing for from two and a half to five and a half years. Barkin is a partner in a shirt making company housed in a Brooklyn building where nine women and four men operated the loom. The fire escape was a trap door between their place of work and Barkin's floor was locked.

Barkin was convicted by a jury earlier this week. His partner, Samuel Simon, and the building's owners, Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Diamond, proprietors of a candy company in the structure, are still to be tried on similar charges.
