BRAVE COPS TRAIL A LYNX; THEY SHOOT AND KILL DOG

Animal Strays Into Butte From Wilds and Robs Hen Coops on East Broadway. Bullets Fly, Dog Falls and Lynx Escapes. Eight Hens and One Rooster Sacrificed in Past Two Days.

Once upon a time "four and twenty tailors went to kill a snail." They didn't do it. This morning two brave police officers went to kill a lynx. They also failed but they went the tailors one better because they killed Police Commissioner Riley's pet Irish terrier, while the lynx is still alive and in hiding in the vicinity of the B and B, livery stables on East Broadway.

The call came into the police station at 10 o'clock this morning, Officer Frazer was selected for the job because of his recent prowess when he shot the head off a turkey that escaped from the hencoop of a poor widow. He took Sergeant Ayers of the cooking department along with him. Both men were armed with army forty-fives and were equipped for big game.

Police Commissioner Riley informed the officers upon their arrival that the lynx had made inroads upon Mrs. Harrington's hen coop. Eight hens and one rooster were sacrificed during the past two days to satisfy the animal's appetite.

REYNOLDS GIVEN THE FIRST OFFICE

Advertising Club of Butte Organized at Banquet at Finlen Hotel.

The Advertising Club of Butte, composed of the men engaged in advertising in this city, was organized last evening at a banquet at the Finlen hotel, with James H. Reynolds, the organizer of the club, as first president. The local organization will be affiliated with the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World. The society will promote clean and legitimate advertising and will do its share for the betterment of Butte.

The new officers are: President, J. H. Reynolds; vice president, John Brophy; secretary, H. T. Snyder; treasurer, Guy Lewis; members of the executive committee, H. J. Lonskey, Garfield Tonkin and W. E. Weber.

Thirty attended the first meeting. Mr. Reynolds thoroughly explained the objects of the association. It was announced that the next meeting would be held on Feb. 8 at the Chamber of Commerce rooms in the courthouse.

Mr. Reynolds in his talk to the society last evening said in part:

"Butte is no longer a rough mining camp with rougher customs and crude business methods, but is the metropolis of our state, a substantial city and a wonderful business center. It has all the civic and commercial organizations to be found in any first-class city—but but one, and that one is an ad club. "And, gentlemen, there is a great need of such a club in Butte—need of the special talents and privileges that are ours because of our profession. Working together, there is no end to the good that we might accomplish for our several business enterprises and for our city. Not only can we, through our programs and discussions that will come up at our meetings, get new ideas and new enthusiasm, but in co-operation with the commercial and civic bodies greatly aid them in putting over any movement that may be instigated for the welfare of our city."

"I have had the organization of an ad club in mind for some time, more especially since last June, when I was one of the three Butte ad men who enjoyed the hospitality and profited by the special papers and discussion that made up the program at the convention of the Pacific Coast Admen's association at Spokane. It was a rare treat to meet the men who attended that convention and to listen to their papers, to the relating of their experiences in our particular field and to gather the ideas that many had conceived, put into actual practice and found good."

"And there is no other way in which we can so carefully guard against such shady enterprises, untrustful advertising and fake schemes of all kinds as through the medium of a vigilant censorship board, backed up by an ad club. Another phase of the advertising game that has become an almost unbearable burden to the merchants of our city is the constant stream of unpractical advertising mediums to which they are daily asked to subscribe. It will be the aim of the ad club to save the merchants much time and money by first passing judgment on all such mediums, refusing to sanction those which have no merit. The money thus saved to the merchants can be used in legitimate advertising, where space means something more than just so much money spent—where every inch used will bring adequate returns."

TELLS HOW TO KILL EGG-STEALING SNAKE

Columbia, Mo.—An inquiry recently received by the poultry department of the University of Missouri stated that the writer had found a snake swallowing an egg in the henhouse and had killed others near, but that eggs continue to disappear both at night and in the daytime. He asked how to poison eggs so as to kill the snakes.

Prof. H. L. Kempster replied: "Insert a few grains of arsenic through a small hole in the end of each egg, or get the arsenic driegit to do it for you. Be very careful that each egg is so marked that it cannot possibly be gathered up by mistake and sold or used on the table. It must be placed where the snakes can reach it readily, but where the egg eating hen cannot touch it, even by poking her head through a small opening and reaching as far as she can."

ALEC M'LAIN IS SHOT IN ARIZONA

Muckie McDonald's Bodyguard Killed—Had Few Equals as Saloon Fighter.

Alec McLain, "Muckie" McDonald's bodyguard during the troubles of 1914 and the man who killed Clifford McGillivary with one blow of his fist some months ago, is dead from bullet wounds received in a saloon fight, according to information received this morning at the police station. Desk Sergeant McCarthy at once telegraphed to Globe, Ariz., for particulars. McLain was well known in Butte as a fighter. When "Muckie" McDonald ruled Butte, the "king" selected Alec as his bodyguard. When the soldiers came "Muckie" left town and McLain was arrested while taking supplies to the deposed "king."

After his arrest by military authorities, McLain was put on the stand to testify before the military court. Some friends of McDonald didn't like his testimony and the same night McLain was badly beaten up. He spent three weeks in the hospital. Later McLain and McGillivary got into an argument. McLain hit McGillivary in the jaw and the latter dropped dead. McLain was released from jail and went to Arizona.

"The report that McLain was murdered in Arizona has reached this office," said Sergeant McCarthy this morning. "It is reported that he was shot in a saloon fight. Telegrams have been sent to confirm the report."

MEALS AT 7 CENTS NET COLLEGE PROFIT

Berea, Ky.—Berea college students put Chicago's diet squad to shame. Seven cents a meal is what food cost each of the 1,400 students at the mountain institution, and at that figure those in charge at the boarding hall clear an average of \$559.49 a year. President William Goodell Frost, explaining this, refers to the economy of numbers, and says that the students are accustomed to plain fare, so that they almost unanimously choose to do without tea, coffee and butter to reduce expenses. To offset these omissions the balanced ration has been introduced.

What the 50-pound mark really means can be realized from the fact that there are today only 15 other cows in the world that, under official test, have managed to cross the 40-pound line. These are all Holstein-Friesians. The test is still being continued on Mr. Cabana's farm at Elma Center, near Buffalo, with a view of also breaking the 30-day record.
