

# MAY TRY TO FORCE THE BILL THROUGH

### In That Event President Wilson Will Veto Omnibus Building Bill.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—The pork barrelers are preparing to make use of the unlimited freedom of debate in the senate to force through the omnibus public building bill, which carries a total of \$38,000,000.

Members of the house who were instrumental in promoting this measure let the cat out of the bag today regarding the procedure that is to be followed in the senate.

As Senator Kern, the democratic leader of the senate, has repeatedly said, the sentiment of the senate is overwhelmingly against the grab, and yet the lack of a cloture rule in the upper branch of congress may open the way to squeeze the bill through.

The plan is for a minority of senate pork-barrelers to engage in a high-handed filibuster at the end of the session and threaten to hold up the supply bills and preparedness legislation unless the senate consents to the passage of the building grab.

The lack of any rule by which a majority of the senate may debate makes this undertaking feasible. It only remains to be seen whether a few senators will dare to fly in the face of public opinion by assuming responsibility for such a filibuster.

The indications are that some of the southern senators are ready to join in the movement and will seek to justify themselves with their people at home by representing that the south has to pay a large share of the burden of pension and preparedness legislation without any benefits therefrom and that the southern states are entitled to public buildings in return for the taxes they have to pay.

The fact that the present congress will adjourn by constitutional limitation on March 4 next furnishes the ideal setting for a filibuster of this character. As the session draws to a close many measures of great import will crowd the calendar and one determined senator with strong lung capacity can almost exact the terms upon which legislation shall proceed.

Advocates of cloture are saying that such a filibuster as is contemplated to put through the omnibus building bill might not be wholly a bad thing for the country, as it would bring strikingly to public attention the archaic and unbusinesslike rules of the senate which for over a century have afforded the opportunity for designing senators to swing legislation at their will in the closing hours of congress.

It is pointed out that there could be no more impressive object lesson showing the "two-thirds" rule in action than that it might create a sentiment in favor of very helpful at the beginning of the next congress when an effort is to be made to write a cloture provision into the rules of the senate.

Every scrap of information that comes from the white house indicates that the president will veto the omnibus building pork bill if it reaches him.



## NEW YORK REPI ACES LIVERPOOL AS LABO CENTER FOR SAILORS

New York, Feb. 5.—New York City is rapidly replacing Liverpool as the center for sailors shipping on merchant vessels between this country and Great Britain, according to Dr. Wiley Webster, secretary of the American Seaman's Friend society.

"The shifting of the labor center for men is due," he says, "to the fact that many ships of both American and British connections have adopted the policy of signing their men for the forward and return voyage at this port.

Under present conditions men are less available on this side, and there are almost no instances of desertion on the British side in comparison with a considerable number of the part of sailors shipping to this country from independent nations.



## CLARENCE GERALD DIES IN SEATTLE

### Widely-Known Cafe and Restaurant Man of Butte, Anaconda and Seattle.

Clarence Gerald, until a few years ago proprietor of Gerald's cafe, now the Mudro cafe of Butte, and widely known in Seattle, where he conducted a similar establishment, died of Bright's disease in his room in a Seattle hotel Friday morning, according to word received in the city. He had been ill for several months and was confined to his room for 10 days. He was 45 years old.

He is survived by his wife, a brother, John Gerald, and a nephew, Ernest Gerald, who conducted his restaurant during his illness. His wife went to Venice, Cal., two weeks ago for her health. He also leaves two brothers in McGregor, Tex. He was born in Clinton, Ia.

According to a Seattle paper he "came into the limelight in 1911 as a witness in the case of Police Chief Wappenstein, who was convicted of accepting bribes from Gerald and Gid Tupper for running gambling and disorderly houses." This also figured importantly in the Gill recall.

He was a candidate for the Seattle city council last year and, although he did not poll a big vote, enlivened the contest with the slogan, "Let us have liberty."

## 4,000 TO PERFORM IN SOUTH'S BIGGEST PAGEANT



Memphis, Tenn.—Memphis is preparing the first and biggest pageant ever staged in the south. It will be a double celebration, beginning May 22 and lasting three days, featuring the opening of the Harahan bridge across the Mississippi and the history of Memphis.

A mammoth amphitheater, like the Coliseum in Rome, is being built to seat 40,000 spectators. Four thousand performers will dress in spectacular and gorgeous costumes, in accordance with the times they will portray.

The stage will be 200 feet wide and 300 feet deep. The pageant history will begin with the early days of Fernando De Soto.

## ELEMENTS INJURE WALLS OF GREAT CATHEDRAL

Rheims, France, Feb. 6.—Frost, thaw and then rain have caused the plaster to become loose from the arches of the famous cathedral which, earlier in the war, was badly damaged by fire from German shells. Large pieces fall constantly and are strewn about the stone floor, particularly in the side aisles. In the nave there are large pools of water.

The department of fine arts of the French government is being requested to hasten work of protecting and repairing certain portions of the cathedral.

Cardinal Luçon remains at Rheims, much of his work being devoted to aiding people whose homes have been destroyed by the German bombardment and distributing supplies sent by the American clearing house. Many packages and cases for the poor come directly from the United States from individual donors, and the cardinal is kept busy acknowledging these gifts.
