LAW WOULD NOT AFFECT MONTANA

Representation of Some States in Congress Would Be Reduced.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, Feb. 6.—Montana's representation in the national house of representatives will not be cut by a constitutional amendment proposed by Senator Poindexter of Washington should be ratified.

The Poindexter amendment provides for striking the word "male" from the second section of the Fourteenth amendment and its effect would be to base representation in the house of representatives and in the electoral college on the voting strength of the respective states.

In counting voting strength women are to be considered as well as men. Taking the vote cast in the suffrage states as a proper basis for representation, because it is contended that only in those states are American citizens granted full right to representation irrespective of sex, the present house of 435 members would be cut to a house of 247 members.

"Sectional influence in the house would be topey-turkey," says the National American Woman Suffrage association, which is backing the Poindexter amendment. "New England and northern states which deny suffrage to women would be hit as hard as the south. The power of the suffrage states in the house would be practically doubled. The principle of basing representation on the voting strength of states is already recognized by the constitution, being a part of the Fourteenth amendment. The republican party has recognized the same principle in its readmission of the apportionment of delegates to the national convention."

The Poindexter amendment is now pending before the senate committee on judiciary. It would reduce the representation of the following states:

Ohio, from 22 to 16; Kentucky, from 11 to 7; Indiana, from 13 to 9; Florida, from 4 to 3; Michigan, from 13 to 8; Pennsylvania, from 35 to 25; Alabama, from 10 to 7; Arkansas, from 7 to 5; Connecticut, from 5 to 3; Georgia, from 12 to 7; Iowa, from 11 to 7; Louisiana, from 8 to 5; Maine, from 4 to 2; Maryland, from 6 to 4; Massachusetts, from 16 to 10; Minnesota, from 10 to 6; Mississippi, from 8 to 5; Missouri, from 16 to 9; Nebraska, from 6 to 4; New Jersey, from 12 to 7; New York, from 43 to 25; North Carolina, from 10 to 6; Oklahoma, from 8 to 4; Rhode Island, from 3 to 2; South Carolina, from 7 to 4; South Dakota, from 3 to 2; Tennessee, from 10 to 6; Texas, from 18 to 10; Vermont, from 2 to 1; Virginia, from 10 to 6; West Virginia, from 6 to 4; Wisconsin, from 11 to 6.

The congressional representation of the following states would remain as at present: Arizona, California, Colorado, Delaware, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, Illinois, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

ENGINEERS MOVE TO SEATTLE SOON
 Electrification Men to Have New Headquarters, With Work in West.

Within a few days the engineers and crews stationed in Butte for two years during the electrification of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway will move to Seattle, where the new headquarters will be maintained while the electrification is extended for 227 miles east of Seattle, through the Cascades to the station of Othello.

R. Beeuwkes, engineer in charge of the work, has already detailed the men in Butte who will have charge of the various phases of this work on the coast, which, when completed, will leave about 400 miles of road between Avery, Ida., and Othello, Wash., which is not electrified. The engineers will leave next week.

The crews will start out of Seattle in a short time on the preliminary surveys for the high power transmission lines and the preliminary steps on the overhead construction will also be undertaken.

The success of the electrification system in Montana, especially in bucking snow drifts and carrying trains through in cold weather, has done much to bring about the extension of the system on the Pacific coast, according to engineers.

Nearly 12 engineers from the Butte office, in the Daily Bank building, will be transferred along with a large number of material clerks, timekeepers and other employees, as well as electricians who are putting the finishing touches on the Montana work between St. Regis and Avery, Ida.

All of the Montana electrification will be completed by March 1.

SURVEYORS START ON N. P. NEW LINE

Former Chief of Mine Workers' Union Has Served His Term.

"Muckie" McDonald is out of the penitentiary and is back in this city. He had been planning to go to Arizona to work in the mines, but for some reason he changed his mind. Yesterday in company with Alexander McLean, one of his old associates in the Mine Workers' union days, he moved about the city meeting old friends. McDonald was the leader in deporting a number of miners out of the city and he set the authorities at defiance. When the national guard arrived in Butte, with some of his companions "Muckie" McDonald left the city and went into hiding. On coming back to the city he was located by Col. Dan J. Donohue and Frank Conley in a South Main street rooming house and placed under arrest. He was convicted of kidnapping and sent to the penitentiary. Last summer he was released on parole and one evening while Gov. S. V. Stewart was addressing a meeting at the Auditorium he interrupted the speaker and caused a disturbance. Warden Frank Conley took "Muckie" into custody and brought him to the state prison.

SPECIAL ELECTION TO FILL VACANCY IS UNLIKELY

While the law provides that the governor must call a special election to fill a vacancy in the legislature caused by death, it is not likely that a special election will be called in Silver Bow county to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Jerry Flanagan.

In the past there have been several instances of where a member of the assembly has died during the session and in such instances special elections have not been called to fill the vacancy. But 18 legislative days remain before adjournment and the time required to call and conduct a special election is so short that a newly-elected member would have little opportunity of participating in enactment of laws.
