

CHARITY BALL FOR LOCAL SOCIETY

Anti-Tuberculosis Organization Deserves Generous Support.

All public-spirited citizens are asked to support the charity ball to be given at the Palladium hall this evening for the benefit of the Butte Anti-Tuberculosis Society. The object is one of the most worthy that have ever been presented to the people of the city. The proceeds will be devoted to enlarging the scope of the local organization which has for its object prevention of tuberculosis and by a campaign of education endeavoring to entirely eradicate the dread disease. The local organization is conducting a free clinic twice a week and is maintaining a visiting nurse at no expense to patients. Those who patronize the charity ball this evening will be doing a noble work for themselves and for the community in general. Sitka's orchestra has been donated and the hall has been also donated by the Falls company.

M. MARTIN BAKER GONE HE IS NOT FORGOTTEN

Authorities Give Up Search for Artistically Inclined Promoter.

M. Martin Baker, head of the "Butte Newspaper Artists' Association," is gone for good but not forgotten by many artists and several buyers of the exhibits at the art show held here in December, according to local authorities, who have given up the search. Baker was supposed for a time to be in Great Falls, Minneapolis or Boston, but police were unable to get a trace of him in any of these cities. Charles M. Russell, the cowboy artist of Great Falls; Lee Hayes of Butte and several buyers of pictures are the heaviest losers. In all, including unpaid checks for \$200, the losses not yet made good amount to nearly \$2,000. A detective agency which was employed on the case expressed the belief that Baker went to Canada.

Mr. Russell has located all but one painting and several bronzes which he loaned to the Butte art exhibit. The picture unaccounted for is valued at \$1,500 and unless settlement is made later Mr. Russell will be out that amount and the value of the bronzes, according to advices from Great Falls.

The late Mr. Lamb was a resident of Johnson county, Neb., since 1880. He was 82 years old and succumbed to a long illness. He was a native of Illinois where he lived until he moved to Nebraska. He was a successful farmer in Nebraska and was widely known in Johnson county. Henry W. Lamb had many friends in Butte also, whom he met on a visit here some time ago.

MRS. A. SAARELA DEAD.

Mrs. Andrew Saarela, aged 29 years, a native of Finland and a resident of Red Lodge, died early this morning in a local hospital. She is survived by her husband and two children. The body was removed to the Daniels & Wilson parlors. The arrangements for the funeral have not been completed, as it has not been decided whether burial will be in Butte or Red Lodge.
