ROBERT A. NICKEL DIES AT HIS HOME

End Comes to Pioneer Architect at Early Hour Today.

Robert A. Nickel, aged 66 years, an old-time architect of Butte and designer of some of the biggest schools and important business blocks in the city...

He was born in Heilbronne, Germany, in 1851 and was educated in Germany, where he studied his profession. About 12 years ago he was injured in an accident and had been an invalid most of the time since then.

Mr. Nickel's death was a shock to the members of his family and his many friends in Butte and other cities. He was out yesterday and visited with several friends.

During his career in Butte he designed and supervised the construction of the Lincoln and Garfield school buildings, the Pythian castle, the Morris house and the Lenox apartments, as well as many homes and business blocks.

He is survived by his wife, three brothers, Charles of Oakland, Cal., Gustave of Butte, Adolph of New York; two daughters, Mrs. J. H. Graham of Worden, Miss Anne Nickel of Butte; two sisters, Mrs. Fortlede of Oakland, Cal., and Mrs. Phillip Bauman of Kingston, Idaho.

Until word is received from relatives in California the arrangements for the funeral will not be completed.

Three boys charged with truancy were found guilty and paroled. They were given into the custody of their parents with the understanding that the first time any one of the three failed to appear at school he would be taken to the industrial school.

USE CHEAPER OIL SOLD FOR OLIVE

Startling Discoveries Made at Health Office—Arrests to Follow.

Butte housewives who have been paying for olive oil have been using for months past nothing but cotton seed oil, a cheaper product, according to the samples that have been made during the past few days by the city chemist, Mr. Harris. Dr. Shea of Boseman during the past week has been taking samples in conjunction with the city health department and many startling results have been obtained.

Pure olive oil is expensive. Some local merchants are said to have taken advantage of the situation and have been selling "olive oil" at a figure that is known to be impossible. The investigation followed. In nine cases out of ten the cheap "olive oil" has been shown to be nothing more than cotton seed oil, a product which might be purchased for half the price obtained for olive oil.

Fred Ackermann of the Independent dairy made a statement today in response to the reported raid on milk dealers, which, the health department declares, resulted in the discovery of preservatives in milk.

Mr. Ackermann asserts that the charges are not that preservatives are being placed in the milk but in the cream. Mr. Ackermann's claim is backed up by the city chemist, who says that saccharate of lime was found in cream but not in milk. The raw product discovered at the plants is no evidence whether the dealers intended to "dope" milk or cream. The city health office claims only to have discovered preservatives in the cream.

WHERE TROOPS WILL WATCH BORDER



This map shows where United States troops returning from Mexico with Pershing will be stationed to guard the border.

- (1) Nogales will have a squadron of the Tenth cavalry. (2) Fort Huachuca, a squadron and a troop of the same regiment. (3) Fort Apache will have a troop of the Tenth. (4) Douglas will have two batteries of the Sixth field artillery. (5) Columbus will be garrisoned by the Twenty-fourth infantry, with the aero squadron, eight truck companies and two pack trains. (6) Fort Bliss, at El Paso, will hold the majority of the troops—the Fifth and Seventh cavalry, Sixth, Sixteenth and Seventeenth infantry, one battalion of Fourth field artillery, the Second regiment of engineers, four pack trains, two wagon companies, all

signal troops except the first aero squadron, and all sanitary troops except an ambulance company and field hospital. (7) Eagle Pass will have ambulance company 7 and field hospital 7. (8) Fort Sam Houston, at San Antonio, will have the Eleventh and Thirtieth cavalry, and two wagon companies, for use in case of emergency along the lower Rio Grande.

TROOPS DELAYED ARRIVE TONIGHT

Montana Cavalymen Missed Connection at Ogden and Are Day Late.

Owing to the fact that they missed connections with the northbound Oregon Short Line train at Ogden Wednesday night the 32 enlisted men and four officers of troop A, First Montana cavalry, who are homeward bound from patrol duty on the Mexican border, did not reach Butte last night but will arrive this afternoon at 1:55 o'clock.

They will remain in Butte overnight, leaving tomorrow morning in their special tourist sleeper for Helena, where they will be mustered out of government service.

Railroad officials stated late yesterday afternoon that they expected the men on the evening train. The Great Northern had arranged to take over the car from the Oregon Short Line for transfer this morning to the Helena train.

Equipment of the troop is being forwarded by freight. The men have been en route since Sunday night from Douglas, Ariz., where they have been encamped since last August.
