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THREE BIG TOPICS FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Much Business is Scheduled to Come Before the Trustees This Evening.

If the school trustees, at their regular weekly meeting tonight, cover all the business that is scheduled to come before them, the meeting will be a lengthy one. Among the business which faces the members of the board are: A further consideration of the report of Auditor J. P. Callan, a discussion on proposed and needed extensions to school buildings during the present year and a rearrangement of the boundaries of the present school districts, or in default of that, the creation of new school districts for the coming school election.

The auditors' report was partly covered two weeks ago. It was not disposed of, however. There were many recommendations in the report and it may be that the trustees tonight will take action on those recommendations. Part of the building program has been tacitly decided on. For instance Architect Wellington Smith is now busy on the plans for the new Lake Avenue school, which it is proposed to make one of the prettiest and handsomest and most modern of all school buildings in this county.

As to the boundaries of the school district, it has been suggested that the city precincts should be used wherever possible. As the city election takes place within a few days of the school election, it is argued that much money might be saved by using the city election list with the small change of the headlines. This may also be decided this evening.

WILL SOON KNOW FATE OF CREW

Sir Ernest Shackleton Was Hopeful of Finding Men Alive.

Dunedin, N. Z., Feb. 13.—The fate of Capt. Aeneas A. Mackintosh and nine of the crew of the Aurora, one of the vessels of the Shackleton Antarctic expedition, who have not been heard from since May 6, 1915, will soon be known. Sir Ernest Shackleton, who sailed from Port Chalmers on Dec. 21, said he was hopeful of finding the members of the marooned Mackintosh party all well, but he realized that they have been exposed to grave dangers and he could not conceal his anxiety about them.

Sir Ernest is proceeding to the rescue of the Aurora, the same vessel from which Mackintosh and his men were separated when the steamer broke from her moorings in a blizzard in Ross sea two years ago. These men have had no means of knowing that Sir Ernest's part of the expedition, which was to have crossed the southern ice cap from the Weddell sea, failed because their ship, the Endurance, was crushed in the ice. Ignorant of this, it is possible that the Mackintosh party divided and some of its members proceeded toward the pole to cache provisions for Shackleton's party, or have gone on in search of him because of anxiety over his non-appearance.

If there has been a division of the Mackintosh party in this manner it will render the rescue much more difficult, for it will mean that the Aurora will not only have to get through the ice in Ross sea and reach the spot where the men were last seen, but Sir Ernest will probably have to undertake a sledge journey as far as last as the foot of Beardmore glacier. Provided the ice conditions are good, and it is now mid-summer in the Antarctic, Sir Ernest believed the Aurora would reach Ross sea by Jan. 5. Sir Ernest could not make further plans until he knew the circumstances, but if he found the marooned party intact at its original base he believed they would be back in New Zealand with the men not later than March.

The stranded men, in addition to Captain Mackintosh, are: H. E. Wild, in charge of stores; E. Joyce, in charge of dogs; J. L. Cope, surgeon; A. Stevens, chief of the scientific staff; the Rev. A. P. Spencer-Smith, chaplain; R. W. Richards and A. K. Jack, scientific staff; V. G. Hayward, secretary, and I. O. Gaze, commissariat officer.

LITTLE ANSWERS TO NEW CHARGE

Pleads Not Guilty—Three Motions of Attorney Waugh Are Denied.

Former Constable W. J. Little appeared before Judge John V. Dwyer this morning and entered a plea of not guilty to the new information filed against him Saturday charging murder, in that he shot and killed Police Officer Batt McCarthy. Previous to the entering of the plea Attorney William N. Waugh in behalf of the defendant interposed no less than three motions, all seeking to show that the new information was not a legal one. First, the attorney asked the court to strike from the record the request for leave to file an information, next came a motion to quash the information and then came a demurrer. All three were denied by the judge. The case was set for trial for Feb. 26.

On application of Attorney M. F. Canning with the county attorney consenting, the cases of Lucile Howland, Beryl Hastings and William O'Meara, set for hearing, were vacated on account of Mr. Canning's physical condition. In making the application, Mr. Canning said that he was not in any condition to appear in court and it might be two or three weeks before he felt equal to have the cases heard. In ordering a vacating of the setting, an understanding was reached whereby the cases could be called up on three days' notice.

The case before Judge Dwyer today is that of J. L. McNeary, charged with robbery. It is alleged that McNeary held up and robbed Roger O'Meara of \$27 last September. County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, Chief Deputy N. A. Rotering and Deputy T. E. Downey represent the state, while Attorneys Joseph H. Griffin and John Elliott appear for the defendant. It is alleged that McNeary not only held up O'Meara, but that he held up two other persons and that in each case he secured money at the point of a gun.

embargoes on food and ammunition to the belligerents. Any or all of these questions are expected to be decided in the near future.

While it was reiterated today that the president would not be rushed into war, it was plain that all officials realized that the much feared overt act might come at any time.

Pending With Germany. Flat rejection by the United States of Germany's proposal to discuss international difficulties without first halting the illegal submarine campaign left one other suggestion of the Berlin government still pending at the state department today. That was to reaffirm the Prussian-American treaties of 1799 and 1828 relating mainly to treatment of enemy residents in war times, with a number of new provisions which apparently would constitute almost a new treaty.

It seemed quite probable that this proposal, the same as that submitted to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin after he had asked for his passports and which he declined to consider, will be frowned upon also.

Yarrowdale Prisoners. Another communication has been sent to Germany through the Swiss minister here looking to the release of the American seamen taken to Germany on the prize ship Yarrowdale and now retained while Germany seeks assurances of the status of her seamen in American ports. The exact nature of the communication is not disclosed, but it is believed to be a demand for the release of the Americans.

FORECAST HIGHER PRICES FOR CANNED GOODS. Chicago, Feb. 13.—Wholesale grocers in Chicago today giving the government's high cost of living investigation with the announcement that canned goods will be about 33-13 per cent higher this year than in 1916. Because of the Florida frosts, which will keep a great quantity of fresh fruit and vegetables out of the market, canned goods will be more in demand as a staple, wholesalers say. It was also asserted that the can manufacturers cannot get enough tin; that the farmers are demanding about 100 per cent more for their crops and that the general consumption has increased.

AMERICAN RIGHTS LEAGUE WANTS WAR DECLARATION

Organization Assailed by Congressman for Stand it Takes.
