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FIGURES BELIE WEATHER IDEAS
Records Show the Month Was Mild, But Snowfall Measured 19 Inches.
The month of February weather records show figures that indicate that the 28 days had an average temperature which was much higher than in many former years, with a greater average maximum and a higher average minimum. Despite the fact, however, the month was consistently cold and since Feb. 2 the traditions of the groundhog have been upheld and Butte may look forward to another two weeks of winter.
Taking today's indications it looks as if one may also expect trouble for the end of March. The old saying is that when "March comes in like a lion it goes out like a lamb," and the converse also holds true. The h-a-a-a of the lamb will probably greet tomorrow's dawn.
The maximum temperature for the 28 days was 46 on Feb. 4, and the minimum for the month was 6 below on Feb. 13. The average maximum was 33.8 and the average minimum 15 above. Nineteen inches of snow fell during the month, a rather unusual quantity. There were two clear days during the month, the others being cloudy and partly cloudy, mainly the latter.

A GRAVE BREACH OF THE BOARD'S ORDERS
The Pupils Defy Commands for Love of Classes--Legend of the Sign.
A most remarkable and disconcerting condition of affairs, betraying an absolute disregard of the authority of the school board and an inclination, rarely found, to violate the commands of superiors in order to attend classes, was discovered today at the Butte high school.
For several months, in fact since the annex to the high school building was half completed, a sign was displayed very prominently over the main entrance. It read: "No one allowed here but employees." Ruthlessly defying that sign the students of the high school persisted day after day in holding classes and absorbing those rudiments of the higher studies that grace the halls of modern institutions of learning.
The sign disappeared this morning. Clerk E. M. Sylvester consigned it to the "manes" of the past. It had served its purpose, having been placed there during the construction of the annex to warn away curiosity seekers and other intruders.

DRAWN-OUT SUIT TO REACH JURY TODAY
After a hearing which has extended over a period of seven days, the suit of A. C. Reed against the Butte and Vipond Gold Mining and Milling company before Judge McClernan is expected to reach the jury late this afternoon. The taking of testimony was concluded at noon and this afternoon the last instructions were read and counsel addressed the jury in an action for \$2,000 for services rendered and money advanced.

REQUESTS DISMISSAL OF COLORED COUPLE
After a jury had been summoned and the evidence taken, Ed Queen-Ann and his wife, Cleo, both colored, were dismissed of the charge of vagrancy by Justice of the Peace Robert Ormsby at the request of the county attorney's office this morning. WORK TESTS FOR GRADE TEACHERS
Miss Faddis Conducts Demonstration for First Grades.
A most interesting series of work and experiments in the first grades one, two, three and four of the Butte public schools will be held this week by Miss Faddis, assistant superintendent of public instruction in the district, and will start on Monday and will continue tomorrow afternoon.
A teacher selected from each grade handles one of her classes in the presence of Miss Faddis and other teachers of the grade in the city. After the children are instructed the teachers hold an informal discussion of methods.
The teachers of the first grade on Monday, the second grade on Tuesday, the third grade on Wednesday, the fourth grade on Thursday and the fifth grade on Friday. The meetings will be held in room 101 of the Butte school.

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
