THE COUNTY HAS BUT SMALL DEBT

Last \$12,000 of High School \$58,000 Bond Issue Was Called in Today.

Anaconda, March 1.—Deer Lodge county is now practically out of debt. During the past 15 years two large bond issues were made, one by school district No. 10 for \$58,000 on April 1, 1902, to run 20 years, for the purpose of building the Anaconda high school.

Today County Treasurer James Murphy called in the last \$12,000 of the high school bond, so that the entire high school issue of \$58,000 has been cleared in 15 years.

BARNEY MARRON LOSES HIS ARM

Well-Known Citizen Sustains a Serious Injury at the Roaster Building.

Anaconda, March 1.—Barney Marron, a resident of this city for the past 28 years and a most popular and well known member of the community, lost his right arm in an accident in No. 2 Roaster building.

Mr. Marron's hand was caught between the conveyor belt and a pulley and the arm was jerked out of the socket in an instant.

The injured man was born in Ireland. He served in the Philippines as quartermaster sergeant of Company K. He has been employed with the A. C. M. company since 1889 and until recently was hired at 511.

duce the senate to consider late house bills failed this morning. Unless the senate reverses itself late today, the only bills that will be put over the hurdles and ridden down the home stretch will be appropriation measures and a few transmitted before the 50-day rule went into effect.

Fewer Bills Passed.

These bills should be disposed of early this evening. That doesn't mean, however, that the lawmakers may adjourn without date as soon as the bills remaining are passed or killed. Both houses must remain in session until the bills that have been favorably acted upon are enrolled.

Unless all precedents fall the closing night of the session will be marked by informal fun-making and skylarking. Usually on last night the galleries are crowded with spectators who stay up late to witness the fun.

Turns Down Appeal.

This morning the senate received a communication from the house asking for the appointment of a committee to confer with a house committee with a view to the waiving by the senate of the joint rule preventing the consideration of bills passed by either house after the fiftieth day.

The senate today did make an exception in the case of H. R. 449. This bill was offered to correct an error when telephone and telegraph operators were left out of H. R. 4 when that measure was engrossed.

Ghost of the Herd Bill.

The senate spent most of its morning wrangling over H. B. 155, the herd bill. This measure was killed in the senate yesterday afternoon on third reading after it had been recommended in committee of the whole.

An Equity Measure.

The herd bill has caused as much debate as any measure introduced at the present session. H. B. 155 was introduced by Sektman, Holt, Bernard and White, and was known as a measure favored by the American Society of Equity.

WILL HOLD LEWIN INQUEST TOMORROW

Corner Lane will hold an inquest tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock into the death of William D. Lewin, former boss trammer at the West Colusa mine, who was asphyxiated yesterday on the fourth floor of the 1,000-foot level by carbon monoxide gas incident to the fire in the Leonard workings.

In Behalf of Oliver.

After Senator Oliver spoke to a question of personal privilege Senator Galloway of Silver Bow offered a resolution condemning in unmeasured terms any and all persons who try to intimidate or threaten in any way members of the legislature for their attitude or vote upon any subject. The resolution also condemned all attempts to interfere with church and political affairs and closed with an expression of confidence and esteem in Senator Oliver.

Hogan, Whiteside and Kane opposed the resolution. Whiteside and Morris endeavored to have the Rev. J. D. Pope given the privilege of the floor, but this was denied him.

Referring to the letters received by him and read yesterday, one by Jacob Mills and the other unsigned, condemning him as a Judas Iscariot for his vote on the Sunday closing law, Senator Oliver stated he brought the matter to the attention of the senate in order that the question would be settled once and for all of whether members of the senate were to have the right to vote as their conscience dictates.

These were immediately offered by Galloway. Hogan insisted the honor of the senate was not involved and said every member was criticized. He added that the member that would bring to the attention of the senate letters received by him "would be low indeed."

Senator Edwards said it was not fair to censure Mr. Pope, that Senator Oliver merely surmised he was the writer of the second letter. Oliver replied he only charged Mr. Pope with statements appearing in a pamphlet entitled "democracy."

Prohibition Bill Passes.

In the house this morning the following senate bills were passed on third reading: S. B. 43, providing penalties for the punishment of persons making assaults upon train crews; S. B. 75, Annin's bill to provide for the enforcement of prohibition under the law approved by the voters at the last election; S. B. 99, authorizing the consolidation of co-operative associations; S. B. 141, providing that the question of issuing bonds for county high schools shall be submitted to the taxpayers, and S. B. 184, an act making it possible for the state to accept the provisions of the federal act appropriating money for vocational training in the state.

The house killed the Searles bill to give counties of the first and second class the right to regulate their own redlight. The Gould corporation tax bill was sent to the governor by the house, which concurred in the senate amendments. O'Shea's hail insurance bill was sent to the governor by the committee of the whole house. The state land office was virtually exonerated from blame in matters involving complaints lodged with the legislature, according to reports of the senate committee composed of Senators Annin, Clark and Roberts.

FAMILY TOGETHER AS NEVER BEFORE

Athens, Greece, Mar. 1.—The attacks upon King Constantine are serving to draw the members of his family more closely about him. Princess Alice of Battenberg, Prince Andrew's wife, who is an English princess and whose two brothers are in the British navy, is as loyal and devoted to her brother-in-law as are his blood relatives.

Attacks Upon King Constantine Make His Kinsmen More Loyal.

"Those who are engaged in the revolutionary movement will return to loyal allegiance the moment the foreign influence is lifted from them," declared the princess to a correspondent of the associated press. "My brother-in-law," she continued, "is precisely what the Greek people need as king. He is a brave and inspired soldier, who has led them to victory; and they adore him for it. You saw the king at the Champ de Mars ride among his people without guard, the people pressing about him, clinging to his saddle, touching him, running along beside his horse. I doubt that if in any other country in the world monarch or president would have been given so wonderful a reception."
