### 10 ANIMALS DIE IN YEAR ON RANGE

San Francisco, Cal.—In spite of efforts by the United States forestry and stock owners themselves, about 7,000 head of cattle and sheep reported lost on government land in California during 1916, according to a report by District Forester Du Bois.

Analysis of the figures shows that 4,465 from miscellaneous and unclassified causes, 1,465 from national forests of California in 1916 aggregated 417,000 sheep

and goats and 195,000 head of cattle and horses.

An experiment on the Inyo national forest during the past season showed the value of the serum-vaccine treatment for anthrax, the dreaded cattle disease. Out of a herd of 2,000, 50 per cent were vaccinated. Within five days 25 untreated ones succumbed.

## MARSHALL TELLS OF HIS CREED OF CITIZENSHIP

Vice President, in Inaugural Address Before the Senate, Says That While Strident Voices All Over the Country Are Proclaiming the Essential Elements of Patriotism, He Examines Himself and Finds That He "Ought to Be Willing to Live or Die, as God Decrees, That This Government May Not Perish Off the Earth Through Treachery Within or Assault From Without."

### THE FIRST VICE PRESIDENT TO SERVE TWO SUCCESSIVE TERMS

Washington, March 5.—Vice President Marshall made his second inaugural address before the senate today. A statement of his creed of citizenship, under a government of laws, he said, "I ought to be willing to live or die as God decrees, that this government may not perish off the earth through treachery within or through assault from without." The address followed "Custom calls for the utterance of a few words upon this occasion; otherwise I would gladly remain silent. It may not be inappropriate to express my gratitude for the little nameless, unnumbered and oft-times unremembered acts of courtesy and charity shown to me by the members of this body during the last four years; to express my regret over the vanishing faces of those who are leaving and to welcome those who in a few moments are to become our co-workers in the cause of constitutional freedom.

"Everywhere in America are strident voices proclaiming the essential elements of patriotism. He who seeks out of them all to select one clear note of love for country may fail. I conceive it to be far more important to examine myself than to cross-examine another. May I make bold to insert in the record some elements of the creed which I have adopted in this period of retrospection and introspection? It does not embrace what I know, but holds part of what I believe.

### Golden Rule of Government.

"I have faith that this government of ours was divinely ordained to disclose whether men are by nature fitted or can by education be made fit for self-government; to teach Jew and Greek, bondman and free, alike the essential equality of all men before

the law and to be tender and true to humanity everywhere and under all circumstances to reveal that service to the highest good of life. I cannot believe when I read the words and recall the sacrifices of the fathers. If ours is not the golden rule of government, then Washington wrought and Lincoln died in vain.

"I believe that the world, now advancing and now retreating, is nevertheless moving forward to a far-off divine event wherein the tongues of Babel will again be blended in the language of a common brotherhood; and I believe that I can reach the highest ideal of my tradition and my lineage as an American—as a man, as a citizen and as a public official—when I judge my fellowmen without malice and with charity, when I worry more about my own motives and conduct and less about the motives and conduct of others. The time I am liable to be wholly wrong is when I know that I am absolutely right. In an individualistic republic I am the unit of patriotism, and if I keep myself keyed in unison with the music of the union, my fellowmen will catch the note and fall into time and step.

"I believe there is no finer form of government than the one under which we live and that I ought to be willing to live or die, as God decrees, that it may not perish from off the earth through treachery within or through assault from without; and I believe that though my first right is to be a partisan, that my first duty, when the only principles on which free government can rest are being strained, is to be a patriot and to follow in a wilderness of words that clear call which bids me guard and defend the ark of our national covenant."

### SCHOOL BOARD WITHOUT POWER TO EMPLOY NURSE

school board has the right under the law to employ nurses for the schools of the district, then it is of no consequence that Mrs. Scollard is not a registered nurse, as the powers of the board are not limited in that respect.

"I have serious doubts, however, as to the right of the board to employ nurses. School boards have very limited authority. They are vested with such powers only as are expressly conferred by law or necessarily implied from those expressly conferred. The statute giving the board power to furnish indigent school children with medical aid does not, in my judgment, authorize it to employ nurses for such children. The words 'medical aid' in the statute are used in their popular, generally understood sense and mean attendance by a physician or surgeon in a professional capacity. Since in this state only licensed physicians and surgeons may lawfully practice medicine and surgery the board is of necessity compelled to employ licensed physicians and surgeons to render such aid when the occasion demands it."

### REV. BROCKWAY ON PEACE MOVEMENTS

Excellent Paper Before Ministers—Arrange for Revivals in Butte.

A very excellent paper by Rev. T. C. Brockway of the Unitarian church was the feature of the weekly meeting of the Silver Bow County Ministerial association today. Mr. Brockway reviewed the efforts of President Wilson and others to promote peace in Europe and to maintain America in a state of peace with the rest of the world. His paper was listened to with the deepest interest and he was warmly thanked by the ministers for his efforts.

Two union prayer meetings will be held March 21 in preparation for the two weeks of simultaneous revival services in all churches affiliated with the association, March 25 to April 8. The uptown union prayer meeting will be held at the Baptist church and the downtown meeting at the Lowell Avenue M. E. church. Rev. C. A. Cook was appointed publicity agent for the revival services.

### HAKALA PLACED ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Former Butte Policeman Accused of Killing Two Men in August.

Jacob Hakala, a former police officer, is on trial today before Judge John V. Dwyer on a charge of murder in having shot and killed Frank Wuorela on the night of Aug. 3, 1916, in the Pine Tree saloon on East Park street. He is being defended by Attorneys E. M. Lamb and John T. Andrew, while the state is represented by County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, Chief Deputy N. A. Rotering and Deputy Frank L. Riley.

The shooting on the night of Aug. 3 was somewhat of a sensational affair. There were several people in the saloon at the time and it is alleged that Hakala, without provocation, pulled his gun and shot both Wuorela, the proprietor of the place, and H. Hendrickson, the bartender.

Two informations have been filed again Hakala, both charging murder. The one he is on trial for today is that of killing Wuorela.

### Jury Secured.

The entire morning and up to a few minutes before 3 o'clock this afternoon was consumed in securing a jury, both the state and the defense using all its challenges. The following are the names of the jurors selected: P. M. Burt, Nicholas Stiren, Jerry J. Sullivan, Pat Moore, Phil Toumey, Frank Peterson, H. P. Brown, R. M. Gibson, W. C. Orton, W. E. Helch, Albert Secombe and Frank McClean.

The opening statement in behalf of the state was made by Deputy County Attorney Frank L. Riley, after which James Cassidy was called as the first witness.

Mr. Cassidy said he was an undertaker and prepared the body of the deceased for burial. He described the bullet wound found in the body.

covered with wreaths, noticeable among which was one from King Victor inscribed, "To a distinguished American officer." The train carrying the body will arrive in Rome today.

A later report on the accident says that Major Heiberg was riding a high-tempered horse belonging to Count Ceriana. The horse ran away, but was mastered by its rider and brought back. Major Heiberg seemed smitten by a sudden illness when he started to dismount and fell to the ground. The restive horse kicked him on the head and he died two hours later without recovering consciousness.
