PIRACY ALLEGED IN PANTAGES ACT

J. P. Goss Allows Until Tomorrow Morning to Call Off "The Smart Shop."

Alleging infringement of copyright and piracy, Attorney T. J. Walker, acting for J. P. Goss of Ogden, Utah, today served notice on the management of "The Smart Shop," a musical comedy sketch on the current Pantages bill, allowing until tomorrow morning to call off the act or pay the holder of the copyright. Mr. Goss injunction proceedings are contemplated in the event that the ultimatum given today is not complied with. Two years ago Mr. Goss says that he submitted the copyrighted manuscript of "The Smart Shop" to Uch, land & street, an incorporated company in Chicago. The present show of "The Smart Shop" has been on the road since October, it is said, and the scenery and dialogue, Mr. Goss claims, have been stolen from his manuscript. Formal notice of the demand has been given to Manager Philip Levy of the Ansonia Amusement company, to Alexander Pantages, the owner of the circuit, Rowland & Howard and other interested third parties.

ROYAL MAIL PACKET DRINA IS SENT DOWN

New York, March 5.—Advices received here from Rio Janeiro and London indicate that the Royal Mail Packet liner Drina of 11,833 tons, with passengers and cargo from Rio Janeiro, has been sunk between Lisbon and Liverpool and the passengers rescued and landed. The South American advice reported that the loss of the Drina after leaving Lisbon "has been announced by the agents of the Royal Mail Steam Packet company in Rio Janeiro. Agents of the company here admitted today the receipt of a message from London signed by the captain as follows: "Drina passengers landed safely."

ATTACK MERCHANT SHIPS FROM THE AIR

Berlin, Friday, March 2 (by wireless to Sarville, March 5).—The admiralty made the following announcement today: "German hydroplanes on the morning of March 1 dropped 21 bombs on merchant vessels anchored in the Downs and on the railway at Ramsgate. Good success was observed. All the machines returned undamaged."

BEMOANS PASSING OF THE OLD DAYS

Trail Blazer Imbibes Too Freely and is Picked Up by the Police.

John Duggan, at present an inmate of the poor farm, a fare dealer in Butte at the time when some of the present prominent men were wearing bibs, told Judge Whitty he was tired this morning and wanted to go home (to the poor farm) and was dismissed. "I got talking with some fellows about the old times," said the old man. "They wanted to buy drinks and I took just one too many. We got talking about the old days when a western man was a western man and not a man controlled by these hard shelled easterners who seem to have taken possession of our Butte—the Butte we made and the Butte that we can't hold. "There was a time in this community, judge," continued the old-timer, "when a man because he was a trail blazer could get by. But the money-grabbing easterner has come and the day is here when we are confronted with the same narrow-minded people that we fled from in the east 50 years ago. "I got drunk that is true. I have been drunk before. But the time was when a man who got drunk in Butte was picked up and sent home by his friends. We were all friends in those days, judge. Nowadays if we get drunk some policeman, who has been in Butte but a few years, picks us up and calls us a saloon bum. He throws us in the can and that's all there is to it. "My home is the poor farm. I'm tired, judge, and I want to go home. "Go home, old trail blazer, and may God bless you," was the sentence that Duggan received from the court.

GERMAN WRITER CONDEMNS PLOT

(Continued from Page One.)

von Reventlow, formerly one of the most ardent advocates of unrestricted submarine warfare and a general supporter of extreme measures, writes in "The Tages Zeitung: "As a result of the publication of the German offer to Mexico, sentiment, which has heretofore been divided in America, is now solidly behind the president.

It's Incomprehensible.

"Viewed from this angle, the offer to Mexico is wholly incomprehensible in view of the Mexican conditions and the further fact that an allied Mexico held out not more promise than the one which would have exploited automatically a German-American war. The offer of such an alliance would seem to rest largely upon a lack of intimate acquaintance with Mexican affairs and American relations. Those desiring a policy permitting a return with the United States to normal relations after the war cannot help but deplore the German alliance plan from this viewpoint alone. Mexico is a frontier neighborhood of the United States and the German offer will not be forgotten so soon. It is to be deeply deplored that the chancellor and foreign secretary neglected to seize the opportunity yesterday to express themselves concerning this episode and their political policies."

No Reason to Be Provoked.

"Americans have not the slightest reason to be provoked at our intentions. Without the treachery which brought the German offer to the knowledge of the United States government the Mexican government would not have learned of it until after the United States had declared war on us. It is well known that President Wilson attempted to incite every neutral state to break off diplomatic relations with us. This was at a time when Germany had not committed a single hostile act against the United States, but merely because we were finally forced to make use of a weapon calculated to hasten the conclusion of
