AMUNDSEN WILL GO TO POLE IN AIRSHIP SOON

New York.—Capt. Roald Amundsen, discoverer of the South pole, sailed for Christiania on his way to Christiania to make final preparations for his aerial trip to the North pole. He expects to return to this country once before making the flight to purchase the most highly developed aeroplane for the attempt.

Captain Amundsen will witness the launching of his new polar ship at Christiania. The equipment which he has been gathering together in this country will be placed on the ship and the explorer will then return to the United States to procure the aeroplane in which he will make the final dash.

The new polar ship will force its way through the ice to a position in the arctic situated at 89 degrees north latitude. This base is 65 miles from the pole. From here the explorer will fly toward the pole with the expectation of reaching it in less than an hour of flight. The aeroplane which Captain Amundsen will use will be capable of 150 miles an hour, the explorer hopes. With him in the final flight will be an observer.

"Ideal conditions for flying prevail at the North pole," Captain Amundsen said enthusiastically. "The atmosphere is clear and still. Many people think of the North pole as extremely cold, but it is much warmer in the summer time, seemingly, than it is at present on the deck of this ship. Only when the winds are high does one suffer from cold near the pole, and fortunately there is little wind around the pole.

"There are no air pockets to disturb the balance of the aeroplane. The atmosphere is uniform in weight and is so clear that the human eye is like the lens of a telescope.

"I hope to fly all around the North pole, with my observer taking notes all the while. The trip is being made solely for scientific reasons."

MANY RESIGN TO SECURE A PENSION

Every Bureau of the Philippine Government Suffers From the New Law.

Manila, March 5.—While every bureau of the Philippine government has suffered in the past six months since the passage of the law which enables the American civil service employe of more than six years' standing to retire on a small pension extending over three years, the bureau of agriculture reports the heaviest loss from resignations and retirements. Fully 50 per cent of the Americans in this important bureau have left the government service.

Adriano Hernandez, a Filipino, the director of the bureau, in published statements denied that these resignations have affected the efficiency of the bureau. He states that for some time past Filipinos have been acting as assistants to the Americans who have retired, thus gaining training to take up the work the Americans leave. Of the 21 divisions of the bureau, seven are now entirely in the hands of Filipinos, while the remainder have American chiefs with Filipino subordinates training to take their places.

In one department—that of the veterinarians—the retirement of Americans has caused serious inconveniences. Rinderpest has for years been a dread cattle scourge in the islands. Last year saw it reach a high mark of fatality just when American veterinarians, already reduced in number and crippled in their operations by the small appropriation for their work, were beginning to tire of the service and take advantage of the retirement law.

Unlike the other departments, there are few Filipinos competent to take up the work of the retiring veterinarians. There is but one institution—the University of the Philippines—which teaches veterinary medicine; primitive farming methods in vogue throughout the country make private employment of veterinarians rare and poorly paid, and Filipino youths aspire rather to the learned professions than to those which demand something akin to manual labor.

So when the pinch of retiring veterinarians was felt, the bureau, after exhausting the local supply of competent men, had to appeal to the United States for other veterinarians. At best these are a poor substitute for the trained men who are quitting since it takes them fully a year to learn the conditions with which they have to cope in the field here.

Among the better known Americans who have recently left the bureau are D. R. Flack, an employe of 15 years' service, who goes to Petrograd to join the staff of the American embassy; there, John T. Zimmer, entomologist, who joins the British agricultural forces in Papua, and M. M. Saleeby, a fibre expert of the bureau since the inauguration of the government standardization of hemp and kindred fibres, who resigned to represent in the local field a New York fibre importing company.

OF THIRTEEN CHARTER MEMBERS, TWO PRESENT AT CHURCH BIRTHDAY

Of the original 13 members of the Christian church of Butte only two were present Sunday at the celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of its establishment in Butte. They were F. F. Irvine of Cardwell and Mrs. J. L. Garwood of 414 South Jackson street. A letter was read from the first pastor, Rev. Galen Wood, now living in Seattle. He tendered his congratulations to the congregation and pastor. Two special musical numbers were given yesterday morning, "Fear Ye Not, O Israel" by Mrs. Frances Harten, and "Oh, Be Joyful" by the choir. Rev. W. M. Jordan, the pastor, gave an address in which he reviewed the history of the church, while Mr. Irvine also told of the founding of the church.

MEETING TO FURTHER WHITE PLAGUE BATTLE

Members of the Montana Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will meet at the Placer hotel in Helena tonight to formulate plans for extension of the anti-tuberculosis campaign throughout Montana. A report will be made concerning the free clinic in Butte, the first such to be established in the state.

BRIDGE AT MELROSE IS GOOD FOR ANOTHER YEAR

The county commissioners yesterday went to Melrose, where they met in joint session with the commissioners of Beaverhead county for the purpose of making an inspection of the Melrose bridge, which is owned jointly by the two counties. The inspection was made as a result of reports that the bridge, which is an old wooden structure, was not in a good state of repair. After an examination the conclusion was reached that the structure was in a perfectly safe condition and that no steps were needed to put in a new bridge for at least another year.

EFFORTS TO SECURE RELEASE OF CHINAMAN

An effort is to be made to secure the release of Quan Sue on a writ of habeas corpus. The Chinaman, who was arrested Saturday by the sheriff's officers on a charge of murder committed in Iowa, has engaged the services of Attorneys A. B. Melzner and H. K. Jones and they this morning secured a writ of habeas corpus, which Judge Dwyer made returnable next Monday morning. A telegram to the sheriff's office this morning stated that an officer with the necessary papers for Sue's arrest is on the way and should reach here Friday.

WASN'T THE WORK OF GERMAN SPIES

Spontaneous Combustion Probably Cause of Explosion on War Vessel.

Tokio, March 5.—Naval officers ridicule reports that the explosion on the battleship-cruiser Tsukuba on Jan. 11 was the work of German spies. The Tsukuba sank soon after the explosion, and the revised estimate shows that 157 seamen were killed and that at least 50 were injured.

The cause remains a mystery, but is explained by a naval man as probably due to a spontaneous combustion in the powder magazine. That there was not a larger loss of life is due to the fact that about half of the crew were ashore at Yokosuka where the warship was at anchor.

Captain Arima just arrived on board from shore when with a tremendous roar which was heard many miles away the ship was encased in a pillar of smoke and flames. The concussion blew a hole in the hull through which the water rushed and within a few minutes the ship began to sink. There were 340 seamen and a few officers on board at the time. Many were killed outright and others were blown into the sea.

Launches and cutters were dispatched to the rescue. Divers who made an investigation found many dead men seated about the table in the mess room. A number of sailors who were on deck were blown into the air and were crushed to death when they fell again to the deck. The bodies of 82 sailors were recovered from the sea and it is believed that the rest are lodged in the wreck of the ship.

The Tsukuba was the first large warship to be built in home yards. On several occasions she conveyed the late emperor and empress during naval maneuvers. The warship visited America on the occasion of the Jamestown exposition. She was regarded as rather superannuated and was lately used as a training ship of naval gunnery.

Captain Arima was saved. The picture of the emperor which hung in the officers' room was saved by Lieutenant Fukumoto, who rushed into the apartment at considerable risk. The ship's flag was also removed by four seamen just as the vessel was disappearing.

WOULD WIND UP THE AFFAIRS OF COMPANY

The Thompson-Montana company has filed suit against James A. Murray in which it is asked that a receiver be appointed for the purpose of winding up the affairs of the company and disposing of the property. It is stated in the petition that Mr. Murray is the sole remaining director of the Volunteer Mining company and it is desired to sell the property.

JUDGE ISSUES ORDER REMOVING GUARDIAN

Judge John V. Dwyer today signed an order removing John M. Tobin as guardian of Henry Tobin, a minor. It is stated that John M. Tobin has permanently removed from the city and that for 14 years as guardian has not performed the duties for which he was appointed. It is also stated that Henry Tobin has now attained the age of 21 years.

EAST BUTTE POSTPONES MEETING UNTIL APRIL

The March meeting of the East Butte Extension company was postponed until April 7 when it was determined that there were not enough shares represented at the March meeting to transact business. Of 562,979 shares issued, 262,646 were represented. The directors are pleased with the progress of the mine, which is producing from three shafts. The officers are preparing figures to be given out at the April meeting.

DR. FERRIS NOT GOING TO INDIA FOR A WHILE

Following instructions from the head of the foreign missionary society which planned to send her to India as a medical missionary, Dr. Phoebe Ferris will not leave Butte for her new field until the war is over and ocean travel is safer. Her plans will therefore be held in abeyance for some time.
