

# COURT ANNULS THE DISCOUNT MEASURE

Supreme Tribunal Holds 5 Per Cent Off Imports Un-constitutional.

Washington, March 6.—The clause in the tariff law granting a five per cent discount in duties on imports brought in American ships or ships of nations with which the United States has favored nation treaties was annulled today as unconstitutional by the supreme court.

Through Justice Holmes the court held that the discount clause designed to aid in upbuilding the American merchant marine was inoperative altogether because it conflicted with existing treaties. It was held inapplicable both to American vessels and to those of 22 foreign nations having treaties.

## White Slave Case.

The court today refused to reopen or reconsider its recent decision in the Diggs-Caminetti white slave cases and denied the application of F. Drew Caminetti of San Francisco for rehearing of its decree affirming his conviction.

## Treble Damages.

The court sustained a judgment in a suit by Thomsen and company, New York shippers, against Sir Charles W. Cayser and other British ship owners for treble damages under the Sherman law for alleged combination of steamship shipping to South Africa in 1899.

## Compensation Law.

The first compulsory workmen's compensation or industrial insurance law—that of Washington state—came before the supreme court today as constitutional. The decision on the constitutionality of the Adamson railroad law was not announced today by the supreme court, although it had been expected.

which have been formed in many cities in this state.

The committee appointed by Mr. Alquist to discuss and report on the constitution and by-laws is composed of Tom Shaughnessy of Butte; L. R. Stephenson of Billings; F. A. Quinn of Augusta; J. Earl Johnson of Bozeman; J. A. Maloney of Lewistown. The committee will also report on the qualifications for a dealer, whether supply and tire dealers will be included, as well as the proprietors of repair shops. Several of the Butte members went on record this morning favoring a movement to include the supply and tire dealers.

## Aims of Organization.

The aims of the organization and the reforms it seeks were expressed by Mr. Alquist today, when he read the preamble to the constitution, which is: "To overcome many unsound and injurious conditions which are existing in and against the retail automobile business in this state, encouraging many bad practices by tradesmen and consumer which are unfair to all concerned, including the manufacturer, agent, jobber, dealer and consumer, and preventing a feeling of confidence and good fellowship and co-operation between men interested in the welfare of the industry, thereby retarding its proper expansion and upbuilding and working an indirect hardship on the community at large. The object of the organization is to bring the dealers closer together, for free discussion and exchange of ideas, suggestions and experience for the purpose of getting combined action in the furtherance of favorable city, state and national legislation or opposing unfavorable legislation or laws that may be in force and for co-operation and affiliation with other automobile trade organizations throughout the United States."
