AMERICAN LINER CREW DEMAND A BIG WAR BONUS

Men of the Manchuria Refuse to Sail Except for 75 Per Cent Advance.

New York, March 8.—If she can get a crew, the 14,000 ton freighter Manchuria of the Atlantic Transport line will sail for London today unarmed. The Manchuria is the first vessel under the American flag to load mails for a prohibited port since the American line cancelled sailings on Feb. 2. The crew struck yesterday for a 75 per cent war bonus. The company had already granted 50 per cent and declined to give any more on the ground that a further increase would be unfair to the men who had sailed two weeks ago on the Mongolia, satisfied with a 50 per cent bonus. Officers of the company said they expected the men would come to terms or they could get a new crew in time to send the vessel out before sunset. The French liner Rochambeau reached here this morning from Bordeaux and the White Star line Baltic from Liverpool with passengers and mails got in last night. The Adriatic from Liverpool is expected to arrive late Saturday or on Sunday morning. A wireless message received by the White Star line said that all was well with the liner. The Minnesota, the largest merchant vessel flying the American flag, arrived here today from San Francisco by way of the Panama canal. She will be placed in trans-Atlantic service after years of trading in the Pacific. She was purchased recently from the German war zone declaration, arrived at London on March 5, according to cable advices received today.

CROPS HELD ON FARMS ARE GREATLY REDUCED

Washington, March 8.—Corn on farms March 1, was about 789,416,000 bushels compared with 1,116,559,000 bushels last year; the department of agriculture today announced in its March crop report. Wheat held on farms March 1 was about 101,365,000 bushels. Last year 244,448,000 bushels remained on farms March 1. Oats on farms was about 393,985,000 bushels, compared with 598,148,000 bushels last year. Barley on farms was about 82,841,000 bushels, compared with 53,301,000 bushels last year.

WILL LOAN MONEY TO HELP STUDENTS

Action of Chancellor Finds Responsive in Butte.

There is considerable interest among educationalists in the action of Chancellor of the University of Minnesota in establishing a fund to be used in loaning students to assist in attending the university. The fund has not been taken up by Butte students, but the September semester will avail themselves of the opportunity to secure an education on the following graduation. Loans are to be made in amounts not exceeding \$100 a year for various institutions, at a 7 per cent interest, the principal repaid not later than the graduation from college. The maturity of the loans will be at the time of graduation. Applicants must be of good character and all applications passed upon by the chancellor. The applicant attends. While heretofore loans have been made to students of other institutions, this is the first time a systematic regulation has been applied to all the institutions.
