WALTONS CREATED RECORD IN SEASON

More Than 10,000 Visited Favorite Streams Along the Short Line.

During the year 1916, from Feb. 22 to Dec. 31, the Oregon Short Line carried on its fishing trains on Saturday and Sunday, 10,384 people, an increase of 1,567 over the season of 1915, according to figures forwarded today to the head office in Salt Lake by Ellison S. Ople, the city passenger and ticket agent. The figures indicate that Glen was the most popular stopping place, while Divide also drew a large quota of the enthusiastic piscators.

Following are the figures showing the number of people who visited the various stopping places between Butte and Hamer during the season, which now lasts through the entire year:

Divide, 1,764; Malden Rock, 474; Big Hole, 127; Melrose, 218; Brown's, 168; Glen, 4,602; Dillon, 2,467; Armstead, 481; Red Rock, 78; Lima, 11; Monida, 69; Dell, 11; Hamer, 19.

The record mark for passengers was made on Aug. 6, when the Sons of St. George held their annual picnic at Dillon. The second best day was on Aug. 27, when 698 people flocked to the fishing streams. The best part of the season was from June 4 to Sept. 1.

WILL LOYALLY PROMOTE GIRLS' CLUB BUILDING

Prominent Citizens Interested in Project Which Appeals to All.

That Butte needs a Butte Girls' club building and that there are hundreds of civically inclined citizens generous enough to subscribe liberally towards such a building, is the opinion of several Butte men who have been interviewed and who are willing to do their share in making the movement for a comfortable building for the Girls' club a success. The movement for a building for the Butte Girls' club has not yet assumed definite proportions and those who are taking the matter over are not yet in a position to announce their plans and be quoted. However, there is a feeling that the campaign will be undertaken early in the spring and that it will be carried to a successful conclusion during the present year.

It is pointed out that there will soon be a Y. M. C. A. here for the young men. There is already a large Masonic building for the Masons. The Elks are to have a new home. The Knights of Columbus will have a new building along in the summer. The Woman's club building is paid for. "Why then not start a movement for a representative club building for the girls of the city, the young girls who have been born and are growing up in Butte, a place where they can meet and read and dance and enjoy themselves?" is the question put by those behind the Girls' club movement.

Several prominent citizens have spoken very favorably of such a movement and there is no doubt at all but that the prominent women of the city would lend their assistance generously. The club has been maintained under great difficulties for several years. The former members of the club, many of whom are married and settled down, will also be willing to aid in a campaign to secure funds for the building.

The first step towards a building fund—a small one it is true, but yet a step in that direction—will be taken Saturday and Sunday by the members. They have secured from Phillip Levy of the Ansonia Amusement company the privilege of using the lobby of the Ansonia theater for the sale of home-made candy on Saturday evening and Sunday matinee and evening. 




