

### SCIENCE PLAYS A LARGE PART

#### Most Important Applications Are Being Kept Military Secrets.

Paris, March 12.—Paul Painleve, a member of the French Institute, eminent in mathematics, deputy for the Left quarter, and until recently minister of public instruction and inventions, declares that Thomas Edison "was rather severe in his judgment when he expressed in a recent interview his surprise that science had played so small a part in the war."

"The most important scientific applications made since the war began are still military secrets," said M. Painleve to the associated press. "When it is all over and details of new inventions and new developments of old ones, discovered and put into practice, used at the front, may be revealed, I think Mr. Edison will revise his opinion and that the world generally will admit that science has done its part."

"To mention only isolated cases, the processes of wireless communication and for the registering of sounds at distance, that is by the ordinary wireless currents and by ground induction, have been marvellously perfected through the requirements of the war. All the armies are rivaling each other in skillful methods for tapping the enemy's lines of telegraphic communication from a considerable distance, not tapping as it is generally understood, but by the use of a marvellous instrument that enables the sentinel in his advanced listening post out beyond the front line of trenches to hear the enemy communications by telephone going over wires that are several hundred yards away."

"No more than an allusion to these things may be made," said M. Painleve, who, as minister of munitions, organized a veritable mobilization of scientists and scientific laboratories in France. The technical sections of his ministry collaborated with inventors to bring to practical use the interesting propositions that were found worth considering. He himself presided over a special commission of men of science, charged with the examination of all new inventions and processes proposed for use in the national defense, and most consequently be regarded as in a better position than any other man in France to know what science has done for the war."

"I would mention also," he said, "a system that we perfected and put into use for locating the enemy's batteries by sound. The principle was known before the war but it was regarded as impracticable. It has, since the war, been brought to the highest state of perfection and efficiency and for months has been in use over the entire front. It has proven so effective that our adversaries, who captured a motor car with one of the outfits, have equipped themselves with similar appliances but lacking the delicacy and the precision of our instruments. It was France that had the entire initiative of this brilliant application."

"Inventions for following the enemy's supply and mining operations by sound, that were, in all respects, very crude and insufficient before the war, have made the most remarkable progress and will reflect honor upon French science later on."

"Aviation in every respect has been remarkably perfected by the efforts of science and technicians since the war began. Today a pilot goes up in all kinds of weather without fear of being upset by sudden squalls, so well have been perfected the measures for the stability of flying machines. Great progress also has been made in the improvement of motors, particularly in the reduction of their weight in proportion to their effective power, so that they speed up to 150 miles an hour. Finally, in spite of the difficulties, wireless telegraphy has been marvellously adapted to aviation."

### VACILLATION IS CAUSE OF CRISIS

#### Senator Walsh Says We Have Not Resolutely Urged Our Rights.

Lack of resolution in asserting America's plain rights under international law in resisting overt acts against American lives, property and rights of the sea is attributed by United States Senator T. J. Walsh of Montana as one of the chief causes of the present international crisis, in a letter received by Mrs. Kerr Beadle, Secretary pro tem of the Democratic Women's Club of this city. Senator Walsh was discussing in the senate of the bill to authorize the president to supply merchant ships with arms confined himself exclusively to the power of the president to arm such ships, but in his letter to Mrs. Beadle he takes up the underlying causes of our present difficulties.

**The Letter.**

His letter to Mrs. Beadle follows: "Washington, D. C., Feb. 28, 1917.

"Mrs. Kerr Beadle, Secretary Democratic Women's Club, Butte, Mont.

"My Dear Mrs. Beadle: I have your valued favor of Feb. 24, written on behalf of the above named organization. I was very appreciative indeed of the confidence reposed in me by the people of your community as expressed in your letter. I wish I felt myself quite equal to the superlatively grave problem before us.

"No assurance is needed from me, I am sure, of my detestation and abhorrence of war. I am inclined to think that the more one knows of the present conditions the less likely he is to believe that he knows just what course our nation ought to take. If we would keep our people and our ships out of the prescribed zone we should have no trouble with Germany. Some people are advocating a referendum on the question as to whether we should go to war or not. The referendum should be upon the question as to whether we shall forbid our people from going within the death area. Are we prepared to go before the people of this country and ask them to subscribe to the principle that whenever two great nations or groups of nations get into war, either may mark off any portion of the seven seas and say to all the rest of the world, 'It is death to you to enter here?'"

**How Long Will it Last.**

"We do not know how long this war will last. It was the general belief when it began that the destruction would be so great, the financial burden so appalling that it could not last six months. One of the highest military authorities at the war department guessed for me that it might hold out a year and a half. It has now been raging for two and a half years and may continue two and a half years more or five more, for that matter. If it really were advocated by those who oppose the course outlined by the president shall prevail, no ships will leave our ports for European waters. You are no doubt aware that all the ships of the American line are now tied up in New York, and do not venture to leave. What will happen if we carry no more goods to Europe from this country, nor receive any from there? Sixty per cent of the copper produced in Butte goes abroad in normal times. Perhaps a higher percentage is now exported. If that outlet is shut off, I apprehend the mines at Butte will shut down. I must reflect on what would happen to the children of Butte if our foreign commerce is destroyed.

"The president is a very wise man. When he stood so boldly for our rights on the sinking of the Lusitania, Mr. Bryan left the cabinet, believing that war with Germany was inevitable, but the war did not come. Although it seems likely that it will, there is no certainty that the course now advocated by the president will certainly bring it on. I think we are involved in our present difficulties because we have not resolutely asserted our plain rights under international law.

**As to Britain's Blockade.**

"No one has arisen to combat the views I advocated in a speech in the senate more than a year ago to the effect that we have a perfect right to ship foodstuffs to Holland, Denmark and the other adjacent neutral countries, though they may be destined to Germany, and that the alleged British blockade which denied our ships access to the ports of those countries is indefensible. Notwithstanding our plain right, her unlawful course was suffered, not without protest, but suffered nevertheless. Mr. Bryan, while he was secretary of state, tolerated many violations of our rights from the same source in a sincere desire on his part to avoid trouble with Great Britain, which might possibly lead to war. Had he boldly proclaimed and asserted our right to trade with those neutral countries, we never should be in the predicament in which we now find ourselves. Perhaps if we again yield we shall not improve conditions.

"You see it is a rather difficult problem, but however it may be, you may be comforted with the assurance that everyone in authority here will do what he can to avoid war.

### CHINA TO FOLLOW EXAMPLE OF U. S.

Representatives Approve Plan of Government for Rupture With Germany.

London, March 12.—A Peking dispatch to Reuter's says that the house of representatives at a secret session approved the government's diplomatic policy including a rupture with Germany.

The Chinese foreign office announced on Feb. 9 that it would sever diplomatic relations with Germany if the unrestricted submarine warfare decree was put into effect. On March 4 the Chinese cabinet agreed that relations should be broken, but President Li Hung Chang refused to accept the decision of the ministers and Premier Tuan Chi Jui resigned. Three days later, however, the premier resumed office, after President Li Yuan Hung had agreed to give the cabinet full power to frame the country's foreign
