DAIRIES OF STATE PRODUCE MILLIONS

Deputy Commissioner Says in 1916 Returns Amounted to \$11,000,000.

With an increase of 49,999 head in two years, Montana's dairy cows number 130,999. They produced during 1916 5,999,999 pounds of creamery butter, 1,999,999 pounds of dairy butter, 899,999 pounds of cheese and cream for 399,999 pounds of ice cream, valued at \$11,000,000 in all, according to W. H. Fluhr, deputy state dairy commissioner, who is here completing an inspection of the Butte plants.

This production is declared insufficient to care for the needs of the state in the winter, because of the greater production during the spring, summer and fall when the surplus is shipped outside of the state. "It is the object of the commission to advocate local storage of the surplus and prevent Montanians from going outside of the state for their products and also to change conditions and to have the production more even throughout the year," the deputy said.

Mr. Fluhr praised the work of the Butte health officers, who, he said, are making every effort to keep the milk wholesome and up to a high standard. The commission is also trying to carry out these policies and to advance sanitary methods in handling dairy products in every phase from the ranch to the consumer as well as to increase the volume of the industry in Montana. This may be done by a higher standard of breeding, he said, and added that the average Montana cow produces 150 pounds of butter fat a year.

Homesteaders are taking to dairying in greater numbers every year, and the commission is inviting outside capital to avail itself of the advantages of the industry in this state. Montana vies with the famous milk-producing countries of Europe in latitude, altitude, temperature and water. We are doing everything we can to aid the farmers to turn out a more wholesome and sanitary product. We inspect the herds, barns, feeds and methods and make suggestions as to improved methods.

Mr. Fluhr arrived here from Missoula, where he found general conditions good. He reported a big increase in the business throughout the Bitter Root, Blackfoot and Flathead valleys, where many professional men are putting capital in the industry. They are doing business under the supervision of experts and are getting good results, he said.

BIBLE IS OPENED HERE AND THERE

Element of Chance in Custom Attending Inauguration of Presidents.

Washington, D. C., March 14.—When the president-elect of the United States kissed the Bible after taking the oath of office the passage of scripture which his lips touched was read with keen interest throughout the country, especially by persons who are inclined to be a bit superstitious and who allow their minds to be swayed by "omens."

The custom requires that immediately after the president-elect has taken the oath, with hand on the Bible, the clerk of the United States supreme court shall throw open the book and the incoming chief magistrate shall implant a kiss on one of its open pages.

James D. Maher, clerk of the supreme court, said today that the opening of the book is entirely "haphazard" and that no man on earth has the slightest intimation in advance regarding the passage of scripture that will be thus brought into notice.

Beginning with the second inauguration of Grant the office of clerk of the supreme court has a record of all of the passages of scripture that have been kissed by presidents since taking the oath of office. In this connection there is an interesting story of the inauguration of Hayes which tends to show that not all of the selections have been appropriate.

Hayes, as everybody knows, was a peace-loving man. Since the inauguration of Hayes the passages kissed by the various presidents are as follows: Twenty-first chapter, first verse: "The king's heart is in the hand of the Lord, as the rivers of water. He turneth it whithersoever he will."

Arthur—Twenty-first Psalm, first and third verses: "The king shall say in Thy strength, O Lord; and Thy salvation how greatly shall he rejoice. Thou hast given him his heart's desire and has not withholden the request of his lips. Selah. For Thou preventest him with the blessings of goodness; Thou settest a crown of pure gold on his head."

Cleveland, first inauguration—One hundred and twelfth Psalm, fifth, sixth and seventh verses: "Great is the majesty of Thy name, O Lord; and Thy strength and length; and he will guide his affairs with discretion. Surely he shall not be moved forever; the righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance. He shall not be afraid of evil tidings; his heart is fixed, trusting in the Lord."

Cleveland, second inauguration—Ninety-first Psalm, first, second and third verses: "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth. He will not suffer the foot to be moved; he that keepeth thee will not slumber."

Cleveland, second inauguration—Proverbs, sixteenth chapter, twentieth and twenty-first verses: "He that handleth a matter wisely shall find good, and whose trusteth in the Lord happy is he. The wise in heart shall be called prudent, and the sweetness of the lips increaseth learning."

McKinley, first inauguration—Second Chronicles, first chapter, tenth verse: "Give me now wisdom and knowledge, that I may go out and come in before this people, for who can judge this thy people, that is so great?" McKinley, second inauguration—Proverbs, sixteenth chapter, twentieth and twenty-first verses: "He that handleth a matter wisely shall find good, and whose trusteth in the Lord happy is he. The wise in heart shall be called prudent, and the sweetness of the lips increaseth learning."



Usually the Bible that is used in administering the oath is bought by the clerk of the supreme court and paid for out of his pocket and is a small Oxford edition costing \$10 to \$15. The late James H. McKinley, for many years clerk of the supreme court, once said: "You see congress expends money only by appropriation and if we were to wait for congress to appropriate the price of the book we might never get a Bible on time." There have been exceptions, however, where the Bible came from other sources. For instance, President Cleveland at both of his inaugurations used a small Bible that had been given to him by his mother. President McKinley used a Bible that had been presented to him by the negro bishops of the country.

The largest Bible ever seen at the clerk's office and Clerk McKinley, in relating the incident, said: "The day before the inauguration one of the clerks called at my office with the Bible. It was a huge affair of the type known as family Bibles. It rested in an ornate box, lined with purple velvet and ornamented with gold. The box was fastened by lock and key. When I realized that it would be my lot to carry that huge Bible from the senate chamber clear out to the front of the capitol my knees grew weak and I could not refrain from asking the bishop, jokingly, where the wheelbarrow was that should go with it."

The invariable custom is that on the day following the inauguration the clerk of the court takes the Bible to the white house and presents it to the first lady of the land as a keepsake.
