SILVER STREET HOUSE GOES TO IDA CONNORS



BUILDERS AND BUYERS.

Although realty dealers report a quiet week because of the talk of the railroad strike a number of deals were consummated and permits were issued for several new homes and business blocks. Among the permits issued were:

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PLANS FOR THE ARRANGEMENT OF BUILDINGS OF NEW DEACONESS HOSPITAL ON THE SOUTH SIDE



The promoters of the movement for a Deaconess hospital for Butte are considering all plans with a view to erecting an institution that will serve Butte's needs 50 years hence. The first start will be a modest one, but additions will be made to buildings every few years, and although it may take 50 years to have all the buildings shown in the accompanying sketch completed, the officials of the Deaconess Hospital Building association believe that provision should be made for future growth of the city. The plans shown above were prepared by F. Lloyd Hamill, who is the architect for the Deaconess Hospital association and also the architect for the Y. M. C. A. building for Butte.

"A hospital with a 'future' is the idea that is back of all the plans being made by the promoters of the Deaconess hospital in this city. All plans tend so that the hospital may grow as Butte grows and that in 50 years time, at the present rate of growth, there will be plenty of room on the grounds to erect buildings. This year's activities, according to present plans, will consist in the erection of two units for general hospital work, while every few years an extra building will be added. The grounds have been divided, according to the picture shown above, with a 50-year consideration in mind.

As time shows the necessity of such a hospital, special departments will be established. The following buildings are in contemplation for 1917: For surgical cases, for medical cases for women and children, for medical cases for men only, for tuberculosis cases with sleeping porches and sun porches, power house with laundry and employees' quarters, a three story nurses home with social rooms and a dining room and dormitories.

The grounds will be parked and lawns and trees will be planted out during the summer, while the first two buildings are under construction. The grounds will be available for patients taking an airing during convalescence and shades will be built on the grounds so that instead of sitting on a porch the convalescent patient may walk upon the grounds and find a convenient corner. Two fountains will play streams of water during the summer and so conduce to the comfort and the pleasure of those who are on the road to health again.

The Deaconess hospital promoters propose that every room will be a cheery place, just like a room from a private home, instead of a cheerless public place. There will be several entrances to the grounds and all are arranged, as the sketch above shows, to allow the utmost freedom of movement. In the management of the hospital it has been decided that all money left after current expenses and charity expenses will be turned into the building fund and for equipment for enlarged work.

HODGE ACQUITTED IN WHISKEY CASE

Court Orders Directed Verdict for One of the Defendants. Clergyman on Stand.

Seattle, March 17.—The prosecution rested in the so-called whiskey graft trial at noon, and the court directed a verdict of acquittal of Defendant Robert T. Hodge, former sheriff. The government's principal witness had testified in Hodge's favor, saying that he had granted no favors to the Billingsleys, liquor sellers, although Logan Billingsley had contributed to Hodge's campaign fund while the former sheriff was running for governor, and had loaned money to Hodge.

Promised to Quit.

Subsequently Dr. Matthews sent for Logan Billingsley, reproached him for continuing to sell liquor, and asked: "Didn't you promise me that you would quit?" "Yes," replied Billingsley, "but it is a lucrative business and I want to make some money in it and then quit." Witness again exhorted Billingsley to lead a clean life.

Kept His Promise.

NO UNEMPLOYED NOW IN ENGLAND

Work for Every One at Wages That Are High—What Statistics Show.

London, March 17.—Unemployment, which, like the suffrage and the Irish questions, was formerly one of the most difficult subjects the government had to deal with, is shown by an official chart just issued by the government board of trade to have now fallen off to the vanishing. In 1908 the unemployed represented between 9 and 10 per cent of the working population. In 1909 it was between 8 and 9 per cent. These were the years of labor agitation which led to the law for government insurance of the unemployed. Up to the time the war began the unemployed averaged from 4 to 5 per cent of the population, from the year 1909 to 1916.
