BAND CONCERTS FOR THE SUMMER

Twenty Free Entertainments Will Be Given by the A. C. M. Band.

Twenty band-concerts will be given this summer by the Anaconda Copper Mines band under the directions of governing board composed of members of the band and Chamber of Commerce. This was decided upon last evening at the monthly meeting of the chamber, when it was announced that these 20 concerts would be given at a cost of \$4,000, half of which is to be subscribed by the members of the chamber and the other \$2,000 donated by the A. C. M. company. The concerts will be free and they will be given in different parts of the city during the summer months. At the next meeting of the assessment committee, plans to raise the amount will be taken up. A. R. Currie was the chairman of the committee making the arrangements.

Following a report by Secretary Austin of the recommendations by J. B. Wharton and William Lutey of centralizing the work of the relief department of the chamber and the Associated Charities, the matter was referred to a committee to report at the next meeting. The ad club wrote assuring the chamber of its hearty co-operation in everything for the good of the city. The chamber promised to give its active support to the G. A. B. and associated organizations for the success of the annual encampment in Butte in May. Formal announcement was made to the chamber that the dates of the state fair for this year have been changed from Sept. 17-22 to Sept. 24-29.
