PLANS FOR AIDING THE ALLIES WITH TREASURE
In Event of War the U. S. May Float a Bond Issue for Their Benefit.

Washington, March 22.—Plans for rendering financial assistance to the entente allies in case of war between the United States and Germany are under consideration, informally by the federal reserve board and other government officials. Two courses are said to have been presented—one, the placing of general credits to entente governments in this country by individual banks to a greater extent than heretofore; the other, official action by the United States government in placing a large sum at the disposal of the entente. Should the latter course be adopted it is thought probable the government would raise the sum desired by a bond issue to be designated for that purpose, the proceeds to be loaned as needed to France, Great Britain and probably other entente governments. Plans are said to be still in a formative stage and may not be definitely shaped until after congress convenes April 2.

SIMON GUGGENHEIM HERE FOR A FEW MINUTES

(Continued from Page One.)

Guggenheim, founder of the American Smelting & Refining company, he is one of the seven brothers. The elder Guggenheim came to this country in 1848, a poor immigrant. He was in business for a long time in Philadelphia, but when the Leadville gold excitement stirred the country in the late '70s he hastened to Colorado. He acquired the A. Y. & Minnie mining property, which has been a consistent producer ever since and which still is retained by the family. Subsequently, Meyer Guggenheim built a smelter at Pueblo to handle his Leadville ores. This was the beginning of the Guggenheim smelter operations which now extend into all parts of the mining country.

In Politics.

In 1896 the Silver Republican party nominated him for lieutenant-governor of Colorado, but as he was less than 30 years of age he was disqualified and withdrew from the ticket. Two years later he received the joint nomination of both the Silver Republican and the Populist parties for governor, but declined. In 1904 he was a republican candidate for presidential elector. That was one of the few times in its history that Colorado went republican, and Mr. Guggenheim had the honor of voting for Theodore Roosevelt for president. Two years later he was elected by the Colorado legislature to the United States senate, and served for the six-year term from 1907 to 1913. He declined to be a candidate for reelection. With his brothers Mr. Guggenheim erected in Denver a few years ago the National Jewish Hospital for Consumption, which they now maintain. He and his brothers also built an annex to the Mount Sinai hospital in New York. Recently Simon Guggenheim personally erected a building for the Colorado School of Mines at Golden, Colo., at a cost of \$80,000.
