MONTANA ITEMS OF
GENERAL INTEREST

Citizenship Papers Refused to
German Who Threatened
United States.

Helena, March 23.—Judge R. Lee
Word yesterday denied Eugene
Gaenzler's petition for citizen papers
because of some remarks made by the
German against the United States
government. The protest came from
residents of East Helena, who claim
to have heard the remarks.

CUTTS' CASE DELAYED.

Helena, March 23.—Judge W. H.
Poorman yesterday continued the Wil-
Ham Cutts case against State Treas-
urer Hart to enforce the payment of
Cutts' salary as a legislator until
March 28. Attorney General Ford
claims Cutts was not legally elected
to the office and not entitled to pay.

SAYS HE'S "NOT DEAD."

Missoula, March 23.—William Wise,
veteran of the civil war, reported miss-
ing several days ago and believed by
his friends to have been murdered,
appeared yesterday to give first hand
evidence that he is still in the land
of the living. He drew his pension
and then left the city to visit some
friends.

DROPS WOMAN DEPUTY.

Missoula, March 23.—Sheriff Green
was notified yesterday by the county
commissioners to drop Mrs. Priscilla
Miles from his staff of deputies. Mrs.
Miles has been serving in the wom-
an's department at the county jail.
The commissioners have decided that
her services were unnecessary.

PLATOON IS RAISED.

Helena, March 23.—Adj. Gen. Phil
Greenan of the Second Montana regi-
ment was notified yesterday that the
platoon of men, 49 strong, has been
raised in Conrad and are ready to join
the Second regiment if needed. The
law permits the organization of pla-
toons in communities where full
companies cannot be raised.

TO SELL PELTS.

Helena, March 23.—F. S. Lusk, F. T.
Sterling, H. W. Parsons, H. B. Far-
nsworth and W. S. Custer, all of Mis-
soula, and A. E. Stapp of Billings and
J. M. Conaway and J. F. Davies of
Butte yesterday incorporated the Mon-

tana Silver Black Fox company, capi-
tal \$100,000. The concern will raise
fox pelts for the market on a ranch
in western Montana. An amendment
to the same law passed by the last
legislature permits the industry.

PLAN NEW BUILDING.

Helena, March 23.—Odd Fellows of
this city yesterday announced plans
for a new building in this city. Work
will start as soon as weather condi-
tions permit. The building will be
three stories high and will contain all
modern conveniences.

PECANS ARE NUTS
OUT OKLAHOMA WAY

Soft-Shell Variety Bring Big
Prices and Groves Are
Planted.

Tulsa, Okla., March 23.—Large
groves of soft shell pecans, which
command a fancy price on the market
and are a wonderfully profitable
thing for eastern Oklahoma, are
being planted in overflow land in
Tulsa county by wealthy oil opera-
tors. One will plant a grove of 5,000
trees this month and a grove of 16
acres planted two years ago should
bear this year. Other groves are due
to bear this year also.

Pecans are native to this country,
and tens of thousands of trees which
yield the small nut are bearing and
are proving a good thing financially.
Some land owners have hit upon the
idea of grafting the buds of the large
soft shell pecan of Texas and Georgia
to the native trees. Last year
several trees thus grafted bore for
the first time and demonstrated the
grafting could be accomplished suc-
cessfully.

Experiments are being made in the
growing of the English walnut in
Tulsa county. It has been argued
that this walnut would thrive in this
country as well, if not better, than in
California, and nurserymen have for
several years been urging orchardists
to plant them. Some of the trees
should bear this year, and the result
will be awaited with interest. If the
venture is a success, thousands of the
walnuts will be planted next winter.

GRAIN SOLD BY SHERIFF
SUIT TO RECOVER PRICE

Noah Headley of Jens Brings
Suit for \$614.55 and At-
torney Fees.

Deer Lodge, March 23.—Noah
Headley of Jens yesterday filed an action
in the district court against J. E.
Neville, sheriff of Powell county, for
the conversion of a quantity of wheat
and oats of the value of \$614.55. Mr.
Headley asks for a judgment for that
amount, together with interest and
\$199 attorneys' fees.

The action is the outgrowth of a
case in district court brought by the
Bonner Mercantile company against
T. A. and W. M. Cram, as a result of
which the sheriff sold the property on
an execution. W. E. Keeley and E.
J. Cummins are attorneys for the
plaintiff in the new action.

BOARD OF CENSORSHIP
FOR DEER LODGE SHOWS

Films of Questionable Nature
Must Be Passed Upon at a
Private Performance.

Deer Lodge, March 23.—County At-
torney W. E. Keeley today gave notice
that all moving picture shows of a
questionable nature must first be
passed upon at a private performance
by a local board of censorship. The
board is to consist of five persons,
three of whom have already been ap-
pointed. Those selected so far are
Rev. W. J. Atwood, Rev. Harris Pills-
bury and Judge H. G. Valiton. The
other two will be women, to be here-
after appointed. Any films not passed
by this board will be prohibited in
Deer Lodge.

The action has been taken because
of complaints which have been made
relative to the character of a show ex-
hibited here in the past. The county
attorney states that the action is no
criticism against any show house or
the character of the productions gen-
erally put on, but is merely done to
safeguard the public from films of a
suggestive nature.

WAS COMPELLED TO
GIVE AWAY BABY

Deer Lodge, March 23.—Muriel Cates
has filed an action in the district court
asking for a divorce from Jess Cates,
on the grounds of desertion and willful
neglect. The plaintiff alleges that she
and the defendant were married in
Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 21, 1910, and that
by reason of the idleness, dissipation
and profligacy of the defendant she
was compelled to give away her 1-
year-old baby in February, 1912, and
that the defendant deserted her in Jan-
uary, 1913. W. E. Keeley and E. J.
Cummins appear as attorneys for the
plaintiff.
