

PERFECTS INVENTION FOR UTILIZING GAS

R. Davidson Has System for Getting Double Mileage From Machine.

Anaconda, March 24.—Ross Davidson of the Park Street garage has perfected an invention that investigators hold is one of the greatest of improvements in the modern automobile. He has applied for a patent and it only remains to receive the final approval of the department. Mr. Davidson, by a clever adaptation of tubing connecting the tank and the carburetor of his machine, has worked out the details of his improvement and is able to get about twice as much mileage from a gallon of gas as heretofore, under the former arrangement of the mechanism. Mr. Davidson has tried out the device on his own machine and several others and the results have been entirely satisfactory.

JULY WHEAT AT TOP OF PRICE

Damage to Crops by Severe Weather Sends the Market Quotations Higher.

Chicago, March 24.—Prospects of increased co-operation of the United States in supplying foodstuffs to the entente nations tended today to lift wheat prices. Initial quotations, which ranged from 1/2 to 1 1/2c, were higher than at the close of the previous session. July and August at \$1.61 1/2 to \$1.61 3/4, were followed by moderate reaction and then a decided general upturn. Subsequently values were recorded by St. Paul, Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific, New York Central, Illinois Central, Chicago and Northwestern, Southern Railway preferred, Missouri Pacific preferred and Wisconsin preferred. Coppers were extremely active with United States Steel, Baldwin Locomotive, Wilson packing, Maiting preferred and Virginia Iron were included among the other strong stocks. Shipments and motors were irregular. Hoarding sales reduced most gains at the end. The closing was strong. Sales were estimated at 550,000 shares. Bonds were firm.



New York, March 24.—The statement of the clearing house and trust companies' clearing shows that they held \$142,765,360 reserve in excess of legal requirements.
