

RUSSIAN HEROINE'S PHOTO SPIRITED OUT OF COUNTRY

Dave Poglisky of Butte, Who Served on the German-Russian Front and Was in Siberia for Years, Gives Rare Picture of Daughter of Russian General, Who Killed Tambov Official in "First Russian Revolution of 1906."

This picture taken at the Russian political prison at Siberia shows a number of women exiled from Russia by the old Russian government because of alleged political offenses. At the left is Maria Spiridonova, who according to recent dispatches from Petrograd, was liberated by the new government. She was received by the people as a heroine and highly honored. This picture was brought to the United States by Dave Poglisky, who came here since leaving the Russian army.

Among the rare pictures spirited into the United States from Russia since the war started is the accompanying photograph of a group of women political prisoners in a Siberian prison camp. The group includes Maria Spiridonova, a political prisoner released from Hertschinsk prison, in Siberia. The picture was brought to Butte by Dave Poglisky, an employe of the Sterling dentist concern of Butte, a resident of Butte for four months and a soldier in the Russian army for

40 months, more than a year of which was spent on the Russo-Germanic front. "Maria Spiridonova is regarded one of the greatest heroes of the Russian revolution, by the Russians of Butte, who want to correct the impression that it was a 'bloodless' revolution," Poglisky said. He added: "For years thousands of Russians have been exiled to Siberia or sentenced to death, not because they did not like any government or the Russian government.

but because the Russian government did not like them. "Russian soldiers are regarded as 'cannon meat,' as we interpret the Russian phrase. The government thought nothing of sacrificing hundreds of thousands of soldiers during the last three years. Anything to hold back the Germans was the policy—no sacrifice of men seemed to be too great. "When Maria Spiridonova, a member of the nobility of Russia, decided to aid the cause of the revolutionists when she knew it meant her death or exile she placed herself on a high pedestal in the hearts of the Russian people.

Your associated press reports tell how she, with other political prisoners from Siberia, was given joyous welcome by the people upon her return from the Siberian prison. She has been imprisoned at Hertschinsk since 1906, where she was exiled after her sentence of death was commuted to 20 years in prison. She shot and killed Chief of Police Luzhenoffsky of Tambov in 1906. She is the daughter of a Russian general, a man high in the affairs of state and of the nobility. While she was in jail she was terribly tortured by two police officers who for 11 hours kicked her back and forth across her cell, tore her hair and burned her flesh with lighted cigarettes. Both her torturers were afterwards murdered.

"For three years I was in the Russian army and for two years was stationed near the prison where Maria Spiridonova, with many other women political prisoners, was confined. The picture was taken four years ago, on a bright sunny day in the summer. Maria Spiridonova is widely known to the peasants and workers of Russia, who regard her as among the great heroes because of the sacrifices she made for them, giving up her position in society to risk her life for their cause. She was active in what we call the first revolution of 1906.

"You Americans don't know what liberty is. You are born with it. Now the Russians may have it. I left Russia never to return. Never mind how I got out, I am here. I appreciate what a great thing your liberty is and once more I dream of returning to my home.

"Citizens of the United States will never appreciate what a great stride the Russians have made, at the sacrifice of millions of men and many women, in bringing about the establishment of a liberal government."
