TO DECIDE STATUS OF GUARDS UNDER NEW LAW

Washington, March 26.—Litigation to determine whether state militiamen enlisted under the old Dick law may be compelled, under call of the president, to give federal service under the new militia law today was ordered expedited by the supreme court at the war department's request. The test cases are habeas corpus proceedings of Alexander M. Emmerson and Alfred P. Lowell, cavalymen who declined to take the new federal oath, and the supreme court decision will affect the status of many thousand guardsmen.

MANN A FORGE IN LOWER HOUSE

At Same Time He is Criticised by Members of Own Party.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, March 26.—For animation and pyrotechnical effects the caucus to be held by republican members of the house next month to nominate a candidate for speaker and other house offices promises to eclipse any caucus of recent years.

Speaking in the vernacular that caucus is going to be characterized by its fireworks. The principal bone of contention will be the election of a speaker. There is much opposition, some of it rampant and open and some of it concealed, to the nomination of Representative James R. Mann of Illinois as the republican candidate for the speakership.

Several criticisms of Mr. Mann are being urged with telling effect against his availability for the speakership. One of these is that he has not been sufficiently pro-American during the crisis with Germany and events leading up thereto and has unduly handicapped the president in carrying out the administration's policy of handling the situation. A criticism that reached farther back is to the effect that Mr. Mann has not been a successful leader of his party in the house and has alienated a good many members of his own party by assuming to do all the leading himself and not giving members a chance who would have been pleased to develop leadership qualifications also if their efforts had not been constantly snuffed out by Mr. Mann.

In favor of Mr. Mann it is universally conceded that from the standpoint of personal industry he is a wonder. He made a careful study of the details of every bill and was armed with information to combat every measure which he deemed unworthy. This kept him on his feet nearly all the time and he consumed many hours which other members thought should have been allotted to them, all of which has created considerable bitterness in the years that have gone by. It was Representative Simon D. Fess who once said that unless there was a change by which Mr. Mann would divide the time with other members and train them in duties of leadership the average republican member would forget how to make a motion to adjourn. The main criticism leveled at Mr. Mann was that a real leader knew how to make others work under him and kept them all busy by a division of labor, while Mr. Mann arrogated to himself all of the hard work, as well as all of the honors of leadership.

Just now an interview with Mr. Mann has started more trouble for him. He is quoted as having said: "There necessarily will have to be some bipartisan organization of the house after organization is effected, if not before it is effected, because of the international situation and failure of either side to have a majority." Republican members who insist on an unqualified and complete attempt to organize a republican house are taking vigorous exception to this utterance. Representative Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin is looked upon as the most likely opponent of Mr. Mann in the caucus.

ASKS \$20,000 DAMAGES FOR DEATH OF HUSBAND

Judge McFerman is today hearing before a jury the personal injury suit of Olive Louder as administratrix against C. M. Everett as receiver of the Butte-Duluth Mining company with Attorneys Peter Breen and A. C. McDaniel representing plaintiff and Attorneys J. B. Roote, H. C. Hopkins and J. A. Foor appearing for the defendant. The plaintiff is asking for \$20,000 as damages for injuries which resulted in the death of her husband. The deceased was employed at the Butte-Duluth Mining company and a plank fell down the shaft and struck him on the arm. The injury was of such a character that Louder died in 45 days after the accident.

VILLAGERS REJOICE OVER EVACUATION

Those Released From German Rule in France Welcome Liberating Armies.

British Headquarters in France, Mar. 25, via London, March 26.—(From a staff correspondent of the associated press.)—The shattered French towns evacuated by the Germans celebrate today their first Sunday of liberty in two and a half years. Countless French flags fluttered in the sunshine from both ruined and half ruined houses, and the women, old men and children who had passed through such a long ordeal of captivity strolled through the up-town streets dressed in the best clothes they could muster. The unique French genius for dress revealed itself in even such pathetic bits of finery the women could find.

Stories of the Villagers.

Here and there groups of "pollus" gathered to listen to the graphic stories of the natives concerning their experiences under German rule. The villagers dwell particularly on the time of terror which immediately preceded the departure of their enemies. All civilians were herded in certain buildings from which they heard explosions and saw the fires which testified that their little homes were being destroyed. The towns where the inhabitants of the region were only half razed while the outlying villages were completely burned down. In this way about half of a town was spared to about 10 villages completely destroyed.

Beginning Over.

Despite the devastation and ruin many French peasants returned today to the sites of their former homes, seeking temporary shelters and bringing bits of furniture with which to begin life anew. They were not downcast but cheerful and almost gay in the enjoyment of their new liberty. In Roye a triumphal arch was constructed as a welcome to the home-comers. In the distance could be heard the reverberating echoes of the big guns, but the ceaseless booming was ignored by the people.

IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE HILL CITY

Walkerville Council Probably Will Plan Work at the Meeting Tonight.

Municipal activities for the coming summer months will be outlined at the meeting tonight of the Walkerville city council, which will convene in a postponed session from last Monday, the date of the primary election. Although no definite work has yet been planned, Mayor John Holland and the majority of the aldermen are anxious to get started on street improvements, and it is expected tonight's session will be devoted to the consideration of that business.

Walkerville spent considerable money last summer and fall in repairing its streets and sewer system. The city has talked of continuing the work this summer, and work may be started as soon as the weather will permit.

One of the first lines of improvement to be inaugurated by the city council will be the grading of West Daily street, beginning at the intersection of Fourth street, where there is a lack of proper drainage, allowing the water to stand for many days during the summer months. Other work has been contemplated by the aldermen in North Walkerville. The streets there are reported by the residents to be in very poor condition and work will likely be started this spring to put them in city-like shape.

A difficult piece of improvement was completed last fall under the direction of the city council when the old sewer from Dunn avenue, down Main street as far as the dump of the Lexington mine, a distance of 268 feet under North Main street, was rebuilt. The work was personally directed by Mayor Holland and the late Jeff McNamee, two miners, who understood how to run a "tunnel" under a street. Engineers employed to estimate the cost of the project and to outline it reported that it would mean at least \$4,000 for completion. The city completed the work for a little more than \$2,000.

The council tonight will consider its regular routine business and as well a budget for the season's contemplated improvement work.

San Francisco, Cal., March 26.—The strangest king in the world today is an American boy to whom 75,000,000 Chinese do homage.

By popular acclaim Francis G. Prescott, 27-year-old Bostonian, rules Szechuen, largest and richest of Celestial provinces, although nominally President Li Yuan Hung's officials are in authority.

He lives in a royal palace of 100 rooms. Hordes of servants wait upon his slightest wish. He is the only white man who has ever stood upon the sacred circle in the Altar of Heaven. That particular end of the world over against the flank of Thibet is his for a nod or a word.

Royalty was thrust upon Prescott by a grateful populace whom he saved, at great personal risk, from bandit ravages, after officialdom had fled. Manager of a big American corporation in Wanshien, he borrowed an army of 1,500 Chinese, protected his own property and the city, driving the Mongol guerrillas from the district.
