FAILURE TO VOTE COSTLY FOR SOME

Neglect to Vote Last Fall or Re-register Bars Many This Spring.

Ignorance of that provision of the registration law which requires that after failure to vote at a general election an elector must re-register will cost many Butte citizens their votes this spring, for until they re-register they are not qualified electors. When registration closed on March 3 for the city election the lists contained the names of 17,371 eligibles. Registration for the school election to be held April 7 closed on March 8.

Changes in the registration list may be made at any time, but a voter must cast his ballot in the precinct from which he was registered on March 3 at the election Monday. Registration is open at all times, but none of those who have registered since March 3 are qualified to vote at the election, since the law provides that registration shall close 30 days before each election for that particular election.

This period of 30 days gives the county clerk time to prepare the registration books for the various polling places. The books for Monday's election have been in readiness for several days. Registration books for the school election also have been ready for some time. Cost of preparing these books and the like is charged to the city and the school district, the county paying only for preparation of registration lists for general elections.

The absent voter's law, which provides that a citizen who will be absent from his home on election day may mail his vote to the county clerk to be deposited in the ballot box of the precinct from which he is registered, applies to city as well as to general elections. A voter who will be absent from the city on election day may vote in the same manner before leaving the city. Absent voters' ballots are counted by the judges immediately after the polls close and before a count of other votes is started.

ALLEGED BANDIT HAS EYE SHOT OUT

Rube Enstrom, an Alleged Saloon Holdup, is in Hospital.

Three men and one woman are in jail pending an investigation concerning the holdup of the Greyhound saloon, 724 East Park street, during which Rube Enstrom was shot in the eye and now lies in the emergency hospital in an unconscious condition. The holdup of the saloon was the most sensational for years in the history of Butte.

Three men entered the place shortly before midnight. Twenty patrons in the bar were ordered to "throw up their hands." About \$200 was taken from the cash register and several dollars were removed from the pockets of the men in the place, in addition to watches and rings.

Jack Henderson, a bartender at the Hawke saloon, nearby, chanced to be passing the spot, where he saw the holdup through the windows. He rushed to the home of a friend and secured a shotgun. He waited until the holdups retired from the saloon and opened fire. The first shot took effect upon Enstrom and when Henderson tried to shoot again the gun failed him. He was then the target for all three of the men, who fired several bullets in his direction. Fortunately Henderson escaped.

The officers, who arrived on the scene a few minutes later, easily followed the trail of blood from the saloon to a cabin at 921 East Broadway, where the four were arrested. They gave their names as Rube Enstrom, "Chicken" Reese, Vernon R. Yaeager and Mrs. Yaeager. Guns were found in the cabin and Enstrom was found to be suffering from a shotgun wound in the eye.

The four people were taken to jail and it was found necessary to remove Enstrom to the hospital, where he soon lost consciousness.

"Chicken" Reese, one of the men arrested, served time in the Deer Lodge penitentiary. A few weeks ago he was arrested for stealing from a junk man. The evidence against him was insufficient and the case was dismissed. Enstrom's condition is not regarded as serious, although he will lose the sight of one eye.

WOMAN GAME WARDEN PAYS BUTTE A VISIT

Shows Western Land Values. Bought for 50 Cents and Sold for \$15.

Mrs. Lottie Curtis Wilson, one of the few women game wardens in the United States and holding that position in Drake, N. D., left here this morning after spending a day at the Thornton. As well as being able to cope with male hunters and violators of the game laws, she is a well-to-do realty owner.

In speaking of the great increase in the value of lands, she said that she purchased tracts amounting to 15,000 acres in 1897 at as low as 50 cents an acre, for which she is now receiving from \$15 to \$21 an acre. She said the land is located near Duluth, Minn.

CARRIER SYSTEM AT POSTAL OFFICE

The Postal Telegraph company will install an automatic message carrier system in the Butte office to carry the messages from the receiving desk in the front of the office to the rear of the office, where the transmission department is located. This was decided on today following a consultation of General Superintendent J. G. Blake of San Francisco, Division Electrical Engineer V. V. Stevenson of San Francisco and J. A. Forehand, district superintendent, with headquarters in Seattle. Other improvements will be made at the local office in order to cater to the increased patronage.

"The present is merely an inspection trip by the officials," said Mr. Forehand. "We find the business in Montana particularly good and through the division it is very gratifying."

ALL READY FOR DINNER TO JUDGE POINDEXTER


